much recent small schools research discusses the benefits of smallness very little of this research demonstrates or acknowledges the various ways in which communities have created small schools that have established the necessary conditions to make them sustainable culturally relevant and linked to social justice while greatly impacting the improved academic achievement of their students Therefore the focus of this book is to advance the school as radical sanctuary concept as described through the history curricula and experiences of urban youth and their teachers in two small urban high schools This book is important for those educationists who wish to deepen their understanding of small school reform and its implications for urban education
