Fantasy and Reason Geoffrey Summerfield, 1984-01-01 *Historical Dictionary of Children's Literature* Emer O'Sullivan, 2010-11-22 Children's literature comes from a number of different sources folklore folk and fairy tales books originally for adults and subsequently adapted for children and material authored specifically for them and its audience ranges from infants through middle graders to young adults readers from about 12 to 18 years old Its forms include picturebooks pop up books anthologies novels merchandising tie ins novelizations and multimedia texts and its genres include adventure stories drama science fiction poetry and information books The Historical Dictionary of Children's Literature relates the history of children's literature through a chronology an introductory essay appendixes a bibliography and over 500 cross referenced dictionary entries on authors books and genres Some of the most legendary names in all of literature are covered in this important reference including Hans Christian Anderson L Frank Baum Lewis Carroll Roald Dahl Charles Dickens C S Lewis Beatrix Potter J K Rowling Robert Louis Stevenson Mark Twain J R R Tolkien Jules Verne and E B White *Childhood and Children's Books in Early Modern Europe, 1550-1800* Andrea Immel, Michael Witmore, 2013-11-05 This volume of 14 original essays by historians and literary scholars explores childhood and children's books in Early Modern Europe 1550 1800 The collection aims to reposition childhood as a compelling presence in early modern imagination a ready emblem of innocence mischief and playfulness The essays offer a wide ranging basis for reconceptualizing the development of a separate literature for children as central to evolving early modern concepts of human development and socialization Among the topics covered are constructs of literacy as revealed by the figure of Goody Two Shoes notions of pedagogy and academic standards a reception study of children's reading based on book purchases made by Rugby school boys in the late eighteenth century an analysis of the first international best seller for children the abbe Pluche's *Spectacle de la nature* and the commodification of child performers in Jacobean comedies *Veiled Intent* Natasha Duquette, 2016-07-26 How were eighteenth century dissenting women writers able to ensure their unique biblical interpretation was preserved for posterity And how did their careful yet shrewd tactics spur early nineteenth century women writers into vigorous theological debate Why did the biblical engagement of such women prompt their commitment to causes such as the antislavery movement *Veiled Intent* traces the pattern of tactical moves and counter moves deployed by Anna Barbauld Phillis Wheatley Helen Maria Williams Joanna Baillie and Mary Anne Schimmelpenninck These female poets and philosophers veiled provocative hermeneutical claims and calls for social action within aesthetic forms of discourse viewed as more acceptably feminine forms of expression In between the lines of their published hymns sonnets devotional texts for children and works of aesthetic theory the perceptive reader finds striking theological insights shared from a particularly female perspective These women were not only courageously interjecting their individual viewpoints into a predominantly male domain of formal study biblical hermeneutics but also intentionally supporting each other in doing so Their publications reveal they were drawn to

biblical imagery of embodiment and birth to stories of the apparently weak vanquishing the tyrannical on behalf of the oppressed and to the metaphor of Christ as strengthening rock *The Reception of Ancient Greece and Rome in Children's Literature* ,2015-09-07 Greece and Rome have long featured in books for children and teens whether through the genres of historical fiction fantasy mystery stories or mythological compendiums These depictions and adaptations of the Ancient World have varied at different times however in accordance with changes in societies and cultures This book investigates the varying receptions and ideological manipulations of the classical world in children s literature Its subtitle Heroes and Eagles reflects the two most common ways in which this reception appears namely in the forms of the portrayal of the Greek heroic world of classical mythology on the one hand and of the Roman imperial presence on the other Both of these are ideologically loaded approaches intended to educate the young reader *Mary Wollstonecraft , Folklore in British Literature* Sarah R. The Boy-Man, Masculinity and Immaturity in the Long Nineteenth Century Pete Newbon, 2018-09-04 This book explores the evolution of male writers marked by peculiar traits of childlike immaturity The Boy Man emerged from the nexus of Rousseau's counter Enlightenment cultural primitivism Sensibility's Man of Feeling the Chattertonian poet maudit and the Romantic idealisation of childhood The Romantic era saw the proliferation of boy men who congregated around such metropolitan institutions as The London Magazine These included John Keats Leigh Hunt Charles Lamb Hartley Coleridge Thomas De Quincey and Thomas Hood In the period of the French Revolution terms of childishness were used against such writers as Wordsworth Keats Hunt and Lamb as a tool of political satire Yet boy men writers conversely used their amphibian child adult literary personae to critique the masculinist ideologies of their era However the growing cultural and political conservatism of the nineteenth century and the emergence of a canon of serious literature inculcated the relegation of the boy men from the republic of letters

British Children's Literature of the 19th Century Patrick C. Writing About Animals in the Age of Revolution Jane Spencer, 2020-06-10 What did British people in the late eighteenth century think and feel about their relationship to nonhuman animals? This book shows how an appreciation of human-animal similarity and a literature of compassion for animals developed in the same years during which radical thinkers were first basing political demands on the concept of natural and universal human rights. Some people began to conceptualise animal rights as an extension of the rights of man and woman. But because oppressed people had to insist on their own separation from animals in order to claim the right to a full share in human privileges, the relationship between human and animal rights was fraught and complex. This book examines that relationship in chapters covering the abolition movement, early feminism, and the political reform movement. Donkeys, pigs, apes, and many other literary animals became central metaphors within political discourse fought over in the struggle for rights and freedoms, while at the same time more and more writers became interested in exploring the experiences of animals themselves. We learn how children's writers pioneered narrative techniques for representing animal subjectivity and how the anti-cruelty campaign of the early 1800s drew on the legacy of 1790s radicalism.
