system Begun in the 1870s it was intended in the words of government officials to bring these children into the circle of civilization the results however were far different More often the schools provided an inferior education in an atmosphere of neglect disease and often abuse Using previously unreleased government documents historian John S Milloy provides a full picture of the history and reality of the residential school system He begins by tracing the ideological roots of the system and follows the paper trail of internal memoranda reports from field inspectors and letters of complaint In the early decades the system grew without planning or restraint Despite numerous critical commissions and reports it persisted into the 1970s when it transformed itself into a social welfare system without improving conditions for its thousands of wards A National Crime shows that the residential system was chronically underfunded and often mismanaged and documents in detail and how this affected the health education and well being of entire generations of Aboriginal children
