Fashion and Its Social Agendas Diana Crane, 2012-06-12 It has long been said that clothes make the man or woman but is it still true today If so how has the information clothes convey changed over the years Using a wide range of historical and contemporary materials Diana Crane demonstrates how the social significance of clothing has been transformed Crane compares nineteenth century societies France and the United States where social class was the most salient aspect of social identity signified in clothing with late twentieth century America where lifestyle gender sexual orientation age and ethnicity are more meaningful to individuals in constructing their wardrobes Today clothes worn at work signify social class but leisure clothes convey meanings ranging from trite to political In today's multicode societies clothes inhibit as well as facilitate communication between highly fragmented social groups Crane extends her comparison by showing how nineteenth century French designers created fashions that suited lifestyles of Paris elites but that were also widely adopted outside France By contrast today's designers operate in a global marketplace shaped by television film and popular music No longer confined to elites trendsetters are drawn from many social groups and most trends have short trajectories To assess the impact of fashion on women Crane uses voices of college aged and middle aged women who took part in focus groups These discussions yield fascinating information about women's perceptions of female identity and sexuality in the fashion industry An absorbing work *Fashion and Its Social Agendas* stands out as a critical study of gender fashion and consumer culture Why do people dress the way they do How does clothing contribute to a person's identity as a man or woman as a white collar professional or blue collar worker as a preppie yuppie or nerd How is it that dress no longer denotes social class so much as lifestyle Intelligent and informative this book proposes thoughtful answers to some of these questions Library Journal

North, 2020-03-26 *Sweet and Clean* challenges the widely held beliefs on bathing and cleanliness in the past For over thirty years the work of the French historian George Vigarello has been hugely influential on early modern European social history describing an aversion to water and bathing and the use of linen underwear as the sole cleaning agent for the body However these concepts do not apply to early modern England *Sweet and Clean* analyses etiquette and medical literature revealing repeated recommendations to wash or bathe in order to clean the skin Clean linen was essential for propriety but advice from medical experts was contradictory Many doctors were convinced that it prevented the spread of contagious diseases but others recommended flannel for undergarments and a few thought changing a fever patient's linens was dangerous The methodology of material culture helps determine if and how this advice was practiced Evidence from inventories household accounts and manuals and surviving linen garments tracks underwear through its life cycle of production making wearing laundering and final recycling Although the material culture of washing bodies is much sparser other sources such as the Old Bailey records paint a more accurate picture of cleanliness in early modern England than has been previously described The contrasting analyses of linen and bodies reveal what histories material culture best serves Finally what of the diseases plague smallpox and typhus that cleanliness of body and clothes were thought to prevent Did following early modern medical advice protect people from these illnesses *Urban Nightlife* Reuben A.
