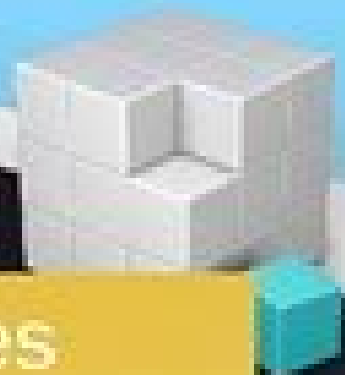

*Effective Strategies for Educating At-risk and Unmotivated Students* Christopher B. Scott, 2012 This study examined what teaching strategies were the most effective for improving the knowledge of unmotivated at risk students Many teachers face challenges of trying to educate unmotivated students students who don't seem to want to make an effort in school Through a perception survey of teachers and a case study of four students the researcher sought to determine whether certain teaching strategies both academic and interpersonal were more useful in educating these students The researcher focused on three key questions including possible causes for a student's lack of motivation effectiveness of cooperative collaborative learning strategies compared to other teaching strategies and whether any other methodologies should be considered in order to effectively teach unmotivated students The research showed that 19 out of 28 67.8% surveyed teachers believed that some type of personal connection with the student and the application of cooperative collaborative learning strategies were most effective 17 of 28 surveyed teachers 60.7% suggested that small groups of cooperative collaborative learning strategies were the most effective at engaging students The case study revealed somewhat different results showing that guided practice combined with personal connection was most effective in teaching the students The conclusions were that a variety of strategies were needed to educate unmotivated students which included development of an appropriate personal connection or relationship with the student to establish trust and teaching strategies that engaged them individually to promote intrinsic motivation within the student
