number of contrasting theoretical frameworks The theory achieves a novel unification of hitherto heterogeneous resumption phenomena It unifies two kinds of resumptive pronouns that are found in unbounded dependencies one kind behaves syntactically like a gap whereas the other kind does not It also unifies resumptive pronouns in unbounded dependencies with the obligatory pronouns in copy raising The theory also provides the basis for a new understanding of processing based resumption both in production and in parsing and interpretation This book makes a substantial contribution to the understanding of the syntax semantics interface the nature of unbounded dependencies and linguistic variation It is clearly written and includes examples from a wide range of languages such as English Hebrew Irish Swedish and Vata It will interest researchers in syntax and semantics and its results are also relevant to computational linguistics psycholinguistics and the logical analysis of language
