Johnson, 2009-03-09 In the wake of the French Revolution Edmund Burke argued that civil order depended upon nurturing the sensibility of men upon the masculine cultivation of traditionally feminine qualities such as sentiment tenderness veneration awe gratitude and even prejudice Writers as diverse as Sterne Goldsmith Burke and Rousseau were politically motivated to represent authority figures as men of feeling but denied women comparable authority by representing their feelings as inferior pathological or criminal Focusing on Mary Wollstonecraft Ann Radcliffe Frances Burney and Jane Austen whose popular works culminate and assail this tradition Claudia L Johnson examines the legacy male sentimentality left for women of various political persuasions Demonstrating the interrelationships among politics gender and feeling in the fiction of this period Johnson provides detailed readings of Wollstonecraft Radcliffe and Burney and treats the qualities that were once thought to mar their work grotesqueness strain and excess as indices of ideological conflict and as strategies of representation during a period of profound political conflict She maintains that the reactionary reassertion of male sentimentality as a political duty displaced customary gender roles rendering women in Wollstonecraft's words equivocal beings

*Laughter and Despair* U. C. Knoepfelmacher, 1973 [Surrealism and the Gothic](#) Neil Matheson, 2017-08-07 Surrealism and the Gothic is the first book length analysis of the role played by the gothic in both the initial emergence of surrealism and at key moments in its subsequent development as an art and literary movement The book argues the strong and sustained influence not only of the classic gothic novel itself Ann Radcliffe Charles

Maturin Matthew Lewis etc but also the determinative impact of closely related phenomena as with the influence of mediumism alchemy and magic The book also traces the later development of the gothic novel as with Bram Stoker's Dracula and its mutation into such works of popular fiction as the Fant mas series of Marcel Allain and Pierre Souvestre enthusiastically taken up by writers such as Apollinaire and subsequently feeding into the development of surrealism More broadly the book considers a range of motifs strongly associated with gothic writing as with insanity incarceration and the accursed outsider explored in relation to the personal experience and electroshock treatment of Antonin Artaud A recurring motif of the analysis is that of the gothic castle developed in the writings of Andr Breton Artaud Sade Julien Gracq and other writers as well as in the work of visual artists such as Magritte *The Practice of Quixotism* S. tragedies the loss of two siblings in early life Strong cultural influences formed the children s imagination polyglot parents French history the Crystal Palace Old Vic productions Winifred s years at Newnham College Cambridge were enlivened by eccentric characters such as the legendary lecturer Quiller Couch Q Lytton Strachey s sister Pernel and Bloomsbury s favourite philosopher G E Moore Her happy life in Paris with her Belgian cellist husband Eugene Gerin was brought to an abrupt end by the Second World War in which the couple had many adventures fleeing occupied Belgium saving Jews in Nice in Vichy France escaping through Spain and Portugal to England where they did secret war work for Political Intelligence near Bletchley After Eugene s death in 1945 Winifred coped with bereavement through poetry and playwriting until discovering her true literary metier on the trip to Haworth She also wrote about Elizabeth Gaskell Anne Thackeray Ritchie and Fanny Burney The book is based on her letters and on her unpublished memoir
