Lewis, 2017-11-20 The Architecture of Medieval Churches investigates the impact of affective theology on architecture and artefacts focusing on the Middle Ages as a period of high achievement of this synthesis It explores aspects of medieval church and cathedral architecture in relation to the contemporary metaphysics and theology which articulated an integrated theocentric culture architecture and art Three modes of attention comprehension instruction and contemplation informed the builders intuition and intention The book s central premise reasons that love for God was the critical force in the creation of vernacular church architecture using a selection of medieval writings to provide a unique critique of the genius of architecture and art during this period An interdisciplinary study between architecture theology and philosophy it will appeal to academics and researchers in these fields
