Halverson, Finn Benestad, 2019-03-27 *Edvard Grieg Diaries Articles Speeches* contains in English translation the complete text of Grieg's diaries as well as all of the articles speeches and other miscellaneous writings that the editors have been able to locate The diaries were published by Bergen Public Library in the original Norwegian *Edvard Grieg Dagbøker* ed Finn Benestad in 1993 and are here presented for the first time in English translation with the kind permission of Bergen Public Library The remaining materials have been gathered from various sources principally the newspapers and journals in which they first appeared The sources are identified in the editors' introductions to the respective items Most of these materials have either not been previously published in English or were published in venues no longer accessible to most readers The nearly two decades that have elapsed since the initial publication of *Edvard Grieg Diaries Articles Speeches* have witnessed a resurgence of interest in the life and work of Norway's most famous composer This resurgence is evident in such things as the increasing frequency with which Grieg's music is performed at public concerts and on the radio the proliferation of competitions for young artists featuring Grieg's music and the growing number of artists who are according Grieg's music a prominent place in their repertoire *Edvard Grieg* Edvard Grieg, 2001 Edvard Grieg 1843-1907 was a remarkably prolific correspondent over 3 000 letters from his hand have been published either in the original languages or in translation but his extant writings in other genres are limited to the items contained in this present volume They include his diaries from 1865-66 and 1905-07 autobiographical sketches articles on other composers whom he admired and essays on a variety of topics that engaged his interest at one time or another during his career The texts of a handful of short speeches are also known to us primarily through contemporary newspaper accounts All are presented in English translation here Readers of Grieg's letters *Edvard Grieg Letters to Colleagues and Friends* know that the great composer was a writer of considerable skill and the items contained in these pages provide further evidence of that fact With the publication of this book all of Grieg's most important literary works letters diaries articles and speeches are now available in English translation *Making Sense of Music* Susan McClary, 2025-05-30 One of the best known prose stylists in contemporary musicology Susan McClary brings together a fascinating set of essays in *Making Sense of Music* that focus on temporality and the body as ways of understanding music Prefaced by a Foreword from celebrated theatre director Peter Sellars the chapters engage variously with ribald songs of the Renaissance the performance of Bach fugues time bending in seventeenth century keyboard works Grieg's Norwegian swerve Florence Price's reclaiming of the spiritual erotic scenarios in Mahler representations of motherhood in Kaija Saariaho's operas and queer elements in classical and popular repertoires McClary grounds her readings within the specifics of historical time and place even as she shows how the music itself relies on gesture and the body In sum this book demonstrates in case studies taken from a wide variety of practices how music draws upon and shapes human subjective experience *Towards a Harmonic Grammar of*

Grieg's Late Piano Music Benedict Taylor, 2017-04-21 The music of Edvard Grieg is justly celebrated for its harmonic richness a feature especially apparent in the piano works written in the last decades of his life Grieg was enchanted by what he styled the dreamworld of harmony a magical realm whose principles the composer felt remained a mystery even to himself and he was not alone in that the complex nature of late Romantic harmony around 1900 has proved a keen source of debate up to the present day Grieg's music forms a particularly profitable repertoire for focusing current debates about the nature of tonality and tonal harmony Departing from earlier approaches this study is not simply an inventory of Griegian harmonic traits but seeks rather to ascertain the deeper principles at work governing their meaningful conjunction how elements of Grieg's harmonic grammar are utilised in creating an extended tonal syntax Building both on historical theories and more recent developments Benedict Taylor develops new models for understanding the complexity of late Romantic tonal practice as epitomised in Grieg's music Such an investigation casts further valuable light on the twin issues of nature and nationalism long connected with the composer the question of tonality as something natural or culturally constructed and larger historiographical claims concerning Grieg's apparent position on the periphery of the Austro-German tradition

Edvard Grieg in England Lionel Carley, 2006 A fascinating exploration of Grieg's visits to England and what the country meant to him showing how it had a far greater impact on his life and career than has hitherto been recorded When Edvard Grieg came to give his first concerts in London he had the world at his feet As the first composer to transmute the sights and sounds of his own spectacular country into music he was held to be both prophet and pioneer and English writers described him as the most popular of all living composers commenting when he returned to London the following year on the Grieg fever that raged in the capital Between 1862 and 1906 Grieg spent some six months of his life in this country for most of the time engaged in giving concerts of his own music as conductor solo pianist and accompanist Celebrated by his fellow musicians among them Delius Parry Henry Wood and Grainger Grieg was befriended by royalty heaped with honours that included doctoral degrees from Cambridge and Oxford pleaded in high quarters the cause of Norwegian independence and found new friends who effected a profound change in his religious outlook This book explores the impact he had on England as well as examining what the country meant to him showing how England had a far greater influence on Grieg's life and career than has hitherto been recorded It also offers an array of fascinating insights into the musical life and milieu of the time LIONEL CARLEY is honorary archivist of the Delius Trust and respected author of many books about Delius

rode at a pivotal moment in the history of fame and visual culture this study probes the neglected prehistory of a visual culture obsessed with celebrities and their images **Banker, Traitor, Scapegoat, Spy?** Antony Lentin, 2013-04-16 Sir Edgar Speyer was a conspicuous figure in the financial cultural social and political life of Edwardian London Head of the syndicate which financed the construction of the deep tube lines and King of the Underground he was also a connoisseur and active patron of the arts who rescued the Prom from collapse enhanced the nation's musical and artistic life at his own expense and directed the funding of Captain Scott's Antarctic expeditions Speyer and his wife the concert violinist Leonora Speyer lived in fabulously magnificent style Early in the early summer of 1914 they stood at the peak of their success and celebrity in London society Within weeks on the outbreak of war they became pariahs objects of suspicion and aversion Despite having been a naturalised British citizen for over 20 years and an ubiquitous public benefactor Speyer found himself ostracised by society and mercilessly harried by the Northcliffe press Under the Aliens Act of 1918 Speyer was summoned in 1921 before a judicial enquiry which found him guilty of disloyalty and disaffection and of communicating and trading with the enemy He was stripped of his citizenship and membership of the Privy Council Pilloried by The Times as a traitor Speyer vehemently denied the charges but he never returned to England thereafter and never forgot his ordeal Grieg Daniel M.
