Edinburgh Through the Lens Ian Torrance, 1990 Ian Torrance three times Scottish Press Photographer of the Year presents a range of images of his native Edinburgh her people places moments and moods **Edinburgh's Festivals** David Pollock, 2023-08-04 In August 1947 an migr Austrian opera impresario launched the Edinburgh International Festival of Music and Drama to heal the scars of the Second World War through a celebration of the arts At the same time a socialist theatre group from Glasgow and other amateur companies protested their exclusion from the festival by performing anyway inventing the concept of fringe theatre Now the annual celebration known collectively as the Edinburgh Festival is the largest arts festival in the world incorporating events dedicated to theatre film art literature comedy dance jazz and even military pageantry It has launched careers from Peter Cook and Dudley Moore in Beyond the Fringe to Phoebe Waller Bridge with Fleabag mirrored the political and social mood of its times shaped the city of Edinburgh around it and welcomed a huge all star cast including Orson Welles Grace Kelly Yehudi Menuhin and Mark E Smith s The Fall and many many more This is its story **Feminist Politics, Intersectionality and Knowledge Cultivation** Radhika Govinda, 2025-02-11 In Feminist Politics Intersectionality and Knowledge Cultivation Radhika Govinda engages with intersectionality as critical theory as critical methodology and as critical pedagogy to make sense of feminist politics in India and beyond and knowledge making on feminist politics as such In doing so she makes a case for theory making conducting empirical research and classroom teaching to be understood as integral parts of knowledge cultivation each feeding into the other Differently put the book encapsulates Govinda s engagement spanning fifteen years and four case studies exploring what insights an intersectional lens throws up and how these insights complicate our understandings of marginality privilege and solidarity in the field of women s and gender studies in feminist classrooms in women s and social movements in particular NGO led feminist activism state led development initiatives and digital feminist campaigns and in everyday social relations in rural and urban spaces Uncovering interrogating and disrupting the politics of coloniality and feminist complicity is an important running thread in the book Through a reflexive account of her own location and practice in the academy at the cusp of the global north and the global south Govinda highlights the importance of being attentive to intersectional positionality and to the contextual specificities of engaging in feminist politics and knowledge making in the age of global neoliberalism **Movable Types** David Finkelstein, 2018 This is a study of international print networks developed across the English speaking world over a significant part of the long nineteenth century The first study of its kind it draws on unique sources from Australasia North America South Africa the British Isles and Ireland to explore how printers interacted and shared trade and cultural identities across international boundaries during the period 1830 1914 Morality mobility mobilisation and solidarity were central to how compositors and print trade workers defined themselves during this period These themes are addressed in case studies on roving printers striking printers and creative printers The case studies explore the cultural values and trade skills

transmitted and embedded by such actors the global networks that enabled print workers to travel across continents in search of work and experience the trade actions reliant on mobilization and information sharing across the printing world and the creative ideas that printers shared through such means as memoirs poetry prose and trade news contributions to print trade journals and other public outlets

Woman's Weekly and Lower Middle-Class Domestic Culture in Britain, 1918-1958 Eleanor Reed, 2022-03-23 A unique intersection between periodical and literary scholarship and class and gender history this book showcases a brand new approach to surveying a popular domestic magazine Reading Woman's Weekly alongside titles including Good Housekeeping My Weekly Peg's Paper and Woman's Own and works by authors including Dot Allan E M Delafield George Orwell and J B Priestley it positions the publication within both the contemporary magazine market and the field of literature more broadly redrawing the parameters of that field as it approaches the domestic magazine as a literary genre in its own right Between 1918 and 1958 Woman's Weekly targeted a lower middle class readership broadly housewives and unmarried clerical workers on low incomes who viewed or aspired to view themselves as middle class Examining the magazine's distinctively lower middle class treatment of issues including the First World War's impact on gender the status of housewives and working women women's contribution to the Second World War effort and Britain's post war economic and social recovery this book supplies fresh and challenging insights into lower middle class culture during a period in which Britain's lower middle classes were gaining prominence and middle class lifestyles were undergoing rapid and radical change

Festivals and the City Andrew Smith, Guy Osborn, Bernadette Quinn, 2022-08-23 This book explores how festivals and events affect urban places and public spaces with a particular focus on their role in fostering inclusion The festivalisation of culture politics and space in cities is often regarded as problematic but this book examines the positive and negative ways that festivals affect cities by examining festive spaces as contested spaces The book focuses on Western European cities a particularly interesting context given the social and cultural pressures associated with high levels of immigration and concerns over the commercialisation and privatisation of public spaces The key themes of this book are the quest for more inclusive urban spaces and the contested geographies of festival spaces and places Festivals are often used by municipal authorities to break down symbolic barriers that restrict who uses public spaces and what those spaces are used for However the rise of commercial festivals and ticketed events means that they are also responsible for imposing physical and financial obstacles that reduce the accessibility of city parks streets and squares Alongside addressing the contested effects of urban festivals on the character and inclusivity of public spaces the book addresses more general themes including the role of festivals in culture led regeneration Several chapters analyse festivals and events as economic development tools and the book also covers contested representations of festival cities and the ways related images and stories are used in place marketing A range of cases from Western Europe are used to explore these issues including chapters on some of the world's

most significant and contested festival cities Venice Edinburgh London and Barcelona The book covers a wide range of festivals including those dedicated to music and the arts but also events celebrating particular histories identities and pastimes A series of fascinating cases are discussed from the Venice Biennale and Dublin Festival of History to Rotterdam s music festivals and craft beer festivals in Manchester The diverse and innovative qualities of the book are also evident in the range of urban spaces covered obvious examples of public spaces such as parks streets squares and piazzas are addressed but the book includes chapters on enclosed public spaces e g libraries and urban blue spaces waterways too This reflects the interpretation of public spaces as socio material entities they are produced informally through their use including for festivals and events as well as through their formal design and management **The British Journal of Photography** ,1867

Queer Trades, Sex and Society Jeffrey Meek,2023-06-01 This book is the first scholarly work to explore male homosexual prostitution in interwar Scotland The male prostitute occupies a contested position within interwar society depending on the perspective he was representative of a descent into turpitude of tenacious organised criminality or of exploitation The book explores connections between male prostitution and criminal gangs prevalent during the interwar period by detailing the emergence and activities of Glasgow s notorious Whitehats a gang composed of a number of queer male prostitutes and led by William Paton This book discovers that although Paton s activities were representative of a career criminal the young men who joined the Whitehats were often driven by poverty and social isolation This book explores the experiences of Edinburgh police detective William Merrilees and his war on homosexuality in Edinburgh during the 1930s through examining the tactics used to regulate homosexual trade and the implications this held for the men involved The book not only explores the attitudes opinions and actions of police officers politicians and the legal process but also uncovers fragments from the lives of the men involved through personal reflections and letters The book explores the anxieties that the trade in homosexual sex provoked not just for understandings of sexuality but also of gender and nationhood and offers a comparative perspective of the forms of homosexual trade in Scotland England and major foreign cities This book will have broad appeal to academics and students in the field of social sexual and gender history as well as the social and criminal histories of Scotland and Britain

Community-based Traditional Music in Scotland Josephine L.
