Sosulski, 2017-03-02 In 1767 more than a century before Germany was incorporated as a modern nation state the city of Hamburg chartered the first Deutsches Nationaltheater What can it have meant for a German playhouse to have been a national theater and what did that imply about the way these theaters operated Michael Sosulski contends that the idea of German nationhood not only existed prior to the Napoleonic Wars but was decisive in shaping cultural production in the last third of the eighteenth century operating not on the level of popular consciousness but instead within representational practices and institutions Grounding his study in a Foucauldian understanding of emergent technologies of the self Sosulski connects the increasing performance of body discipline by professional actors soldiers and schoolchildren to the growing interest in German national identity.
