On the Trail to Wittgenstein's Hut Ivar Oxaal, 2011-12-31 One of the most influential philosophers of the twentieth century Ludwig Wittgenstein and the roots of his monumental *Tractatus* are explored in this imaginative work Oxaal picks up on themes developed in an earlier work of his on *Jews Anti-Semitism and Culture in Vienna* adding to it special issues concerning Wittgenstein's experiences in Norway in 1913-14 where he worked on ideas that were completed during the war Oxaal situates the great philosopher in time place and attitude showing how his personal background came to bear on the writing of the *Tractatus* Wittgenstein has often been criticized for traces of solipsism and even mysticism and Oxaal also examines these issues in a volume that integrates ethnography nationality and cultural studies Oxaal sheds new light on the theme of Wittgenstein's Jewishness and develops a new appreciation of the Wittgenstein family and Wittgenstein's better known years in Vienna The author is unsparing in his observations about racism and pessimism in Berlin and Great Britain during the period in which Wittgenstein worked and studied at Cambridge The writing of the *Tractatus* spanned the First World War In the period immediately after its completion Wittgenstein found himself in The Hague where he was in discussions and disputes with Bertrand Russell Oxaal covers these problems sensitively and with an appreciation of ambiguities in the life of a great philosopher and the confusions caused by a post-war change in fortunes personal and familial This work of an eminent social scientist and historian may not be the final statement on Wittgenstein but it most certainly must be considered in any serious assessments of an iconic figure of the twentieth century

Wittgenstein's On Certainty: Insight and Method Robert Greenleaf Brice, 2022-02-01 This book considers the important twentieth-century Austrian philosopher Ludwig Wittgenstein and his conception of certainty In his work entitled *On Certainty* Wittgenstein provides not only a brilliant solution to a previously intractable philosophical problem but also the elements of an entirely new way of approaching this and similar longstanding apparently unresolvable problems In *On Certainty* he re-conceives the problem of radical skepticism the claim that we can never really be certain of anything except the contents of our own minds as a kind of philosophical disease of thought His approach to the problem which is emphasized in the book is similar to the treatment of disease has two main goals 1 bring about an awareness in the philosopher that this kind of extreme skepticism is not a methodological approach to be taken seriously and with this awareness 2 an attempt to

replace this radical skepticism with a practical Common Sense framework Implicit in Wittgenstein's approach are a number of strategies found in a contemporary approach to psychotherapy known as Cognitive Behavioral Therapy CBT These strategies along with philosophical methods and scientific practices rooted in the Scottish School of Common Sense seek to diagnose and treat irrational thoughts and beliefs that often emerge and re-emerge in the discipline of philosophy The aim of this book then is to provide students of philosophy with the tools necessary to adjust and reshape these irrational self-defeating thoughts and beliefs into something new something healthy

Cook, 1994-01-28 Wittgenstein's Metaphysics offers a radical new interpretation of the fundamental ideas of Ludwig Wittgenstein It takes issue with the conventional view that after 1930 Wittgenstein rejected the philosophy of the Tractatus and developed a wholly new conception of philosophy By tracing the evolution of Wittgenstein's ideas Cook shows that they are neither as original nor as difficult as is often supposed Wittgenstein was essentially an empiricist and the difference between his early views as set forth in the Tractatus and the later views as expounded in the Philosophical Investigations lies chiefly in the fact that after 1930 he replaced his early version of reductionism with a subtler version So he ended where he began as an empiricist armed with a theory of meaning This iconoclastic interpretation is sure to influence all future study of Wittgenstein and will provoke a reassessment of the nature of his contribution to philosophy

Wittgenstein's Philosophy of Mind (Routledge Revivals) Ashok Vohra, 2014-04-08 Philosophers since Descartes have felt themselves compelled to make a choice between mind and body Wittgenstein's Philosophy of Mind first published in 1986 argues that there is no genuine epistemological problem of mind and that the widespread philosophical scepticism with regard to our knowledge of other minds is without foundation Ashok Vohra applies Wittgenstein's method to show that the problem has arisen through a tendency to over-philosophise our simple experiences Vohra presents a positive account of Wittgenstein's philosophy of mind arguing that to consider his philosophy entirely destructive is misleading He shows that knowledge of mind is gained through a large complex of intersubjectively identifiable factors such as the linguistic and non-linguistic past present and future behaviour of the person concerned He thus justifies the belief on which psychology and psychoanalysis are based that mind is not a mystery to which only the owner has privileged access
