George Lambert Art And Artifice 1873-1930:

George Lambert, 1873-1930 Anne Gray, George Lambert, 1996 In this long awaited monograph art historian Anne Gray draws upon a mass of documents to reveal Lambert's considerable achievements in his art and his life Biographical information is integrated with detailed analysis of the works of art many of which are now regarded as major examples of early twentieth century art Gray traces Lambert's emergence from a rural environment and recounts how Lambert's exposure to Paris and to the art of the British moderns ran parallel to an increasingly complex personal life A sympathetic account is given of his marriage to Amy Lambert his relationship with Thea Proctor and his many friendships with artists and local eccentrics Above all Lambert is revealed as an artist who worked at his art with unfailing dedication frequently pushing himself to the point of exhaustion and finally to death

Identity, Community and Australian Artists, 1890-1914 Kate R. Robertson, 2019-09-19 An irresistible call lured Australian artists abroad between 1890 and 1914 a transitional period immediately pre and post federation Travelling enabled an extension of artistic frontiers and Paris the centre of art and London the heart of the Empire promised wondrous opportunities These expatriate artists formed communities based on their common bond to Australia enacting their Australian-ness in private and public settings Yet they also interacted with the broader creative community fashioning a network of social and professional relationships They joined ateliers in Paris such as the Académie Julian clubs like the Chelsea Arts Club in London and visited artist colonies including St Ives in England and Giverny in France Australian artists persistently sought a sense of belonging negotiating their identity through activities such as plays balls tableaux parties dressing up and of course the creation of art While individual biographies are integral to this study it is through exploring the connections between them that it offers new insights Through utilising extensive archival material much of which has limited or no publication history this book fills a gap in existing scholarship It offers a vital exploration re-consideration of the fluidity of identity place and belonging in the lives and work of Australian artists in this juncture in British Australian history

Women, Art and Money in Late Victorian and Edwardian England Maria Quirk, 2019-05-16 *Women Art and Money in England* establishes the importance of women artists commercial dealings to their professional identities and reputations in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries Grounded in economic social and art history the book draws on and synthesises data from a broad range of documentary and archival sources to present a comprehensive history of women artists professional status and business relationships within the complex and changing art market of late Victorian England By providing new insights into the routines and incomes of women artists and the spaces where they created exhibited and sold their art this book challenges

established ideas about what women had to do to be considered professional artists More important than a Royal Academy education or membership to exhibiting societies was a woman's ability to sell her work This meant that women had strong incentive to paint in saleable popular and middlebrow genres which reinforced prejudices towards women's naturally inferior artistic ability prejudices that continued far into the twentieth century From shining a light on the difficult to trace pecuniary arrangements of little researched artists like Ethel Mortlock to offering new and direct comparisons between the incomes earned by male and female artists and the genres commissions and exhibitions that earned women the most money *Women Art and Money* is a timely contribution to the history of women's working lives that is relevant to a number of scholarly disciplines

"Painted Men in Britain, 1868-1918" Jongwoo Jeremy Kim, 2017-07-05 An original and overdue exploration of the representation of masculinity in British academic art in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries *Painted Men in Britain 1868-1918* analyzes transgressions of gender and sexuality as represented in paintings by Leighton Sargent Tuke and their contemporaries in the Royal Academy This volume treats paintings as eloquent objects no narratives of which are too elusive to be traced and challenges conventional binaries of masculine versus feminine or heterosexual versus homosexual Consulting not only the paintings themselves but also newspapers journals criticism novels and poetry of the day *Painted Men* argues against the misconception of British academic art as merely reactionary and even blind to the dynamism of its own time Instead this art is shown to engage with broader social attitudes and contemporary sexual debates As the book reveals the complexities of specific paintings it illuminates different and competing attitudes toward masculinity and modernity in British art of the period

The Edwardians Anne Gray, 2004 This catalogue accompanies the exhibition opening at the National Gallery of Australia in March 2004 that aims to reassess the art of the Edwardian period focusing in particular on the art of Australia Among Australia's most loved artists are those who went to Europe at the turn of the 19th century to study and live Many of them stayed abroad for two decades and like Australian film stars of today became absorbed onto the world stage This book places the work of these artists in the context of the British Irish and American artists with whom they exhibited and associated and demonstrates their parallel concerns in painterly approach and subject Opening with paintings by Whistler which were so influential on the artists of this period the exhibition focuses on figurative paintings by select British Irish American and Australian artists from 1900 to 1914 It also includes George Lambert's *King Edward VII 1910* completed shortly before Edward's death and now held in the Commonwealth of Australia Collection In total the exhibition comprises approximately 140 paintings sculptures costumes and fan designs drawn from national and international collections

Useless Beauty Ann Elias, 2015-10-05 The story of Australian art does not begin and end with landscape This book puts flowers front and centre because they have often been ignored in preference for more masculine themes Departing from where studies of single flower artists leave off *Useless Beauty* embraces the general
