Social Functions and Economic Aspects of Health Insurance William A. Rushing, 2012-12-06 Statistics published by the U S Department of Commerce 1980 indicate that in 1977 we spent 8.1% of our gross national product GNP on life health property casualty and other forms of insurance An additional 5.7% was used to pay the Social Security tax which is another form of insurance premium for a total of 14.8% of the GNP Although insurance had its historical origin in marine insurance it has now developed into one of the major industries of the American economy and extends into many areas of economic activity One area where growth has been particularly strong is the medical sector Health insurance is a major institution in all industrialized countries It became a government responsibility in 1883 when Bismarck introduced a compulsory program of health insurance for industrial workers in Germany Programs for workers in various industrial and income categories soon followed in other European countries Austria 1888 Hungary 1891 Norway 1909 Serbia 1910 Great Britain 1911 and Russia and Romania 1912 Rubinow 1913 250 Programs in these countries were extended in subsequent years and other countries in Europe followed with their own programs Consequently today most industrial countries have universal or near universal health insurance coverage In the United States the issue of national health insurance has been seriously debated since just prior to World War I and polling data since the 1930s show that a substantial majority of the public has been supportive of such a program Erskine 1975

Despite the growing activity in the field of health economics very little is known about the influence of economic evaluation studies on health care decision making in the EU member states Several investigations about the impact of health economic studies on decision making have been done but most of them did not involve decision makers themselves In this work the results of the EUROMET survey are reported and discussed To allow an international perspective different types of decision makers in nine European countries were surveyed Besides the extent of knowledge about economic evaluation the actual and potential use of study results as well as barriers and incentives for the use of economic evaluation studies had been investigated

Paul Paelinck, 1990-12-31 Econometrics of Health Care which we have sometimes called medico metrics is a field in full expansion The reasons are numerous our knowledge of quantitative relations in the field of health econometrics is far from being perfect a large number of analytical difficulties combining medical latent factors e g and economic facts spatial behaviour e g are faced by the research worker medical and pharmaceutical techniques change rapidly medical costs rocket more than proportionally with available resources of being tightened medical budgets are in the process So it is not surprising that the practice of hygieconometrics to produce a neologism is more and more included in the programmes of econometrians The Applied Econometrics Association has devoted to the topic two symposia in less than three years Lyons February 1983 Rotterdam December 1985 without experiencing any difficulties in getting valuable papers on econometrics of risks and medical insurance on the measurement of health status and of efficiency of medical techniques on general models allowing simulation These were the themes for the second meeting but other aspects of medical economic problems had presented themselves already to the analyst medical decision making and its consequences the behaviour of the actors patients and physicians regional medicometrics and what not some of them have been covered by the first meeting Finally in July 1988 took place in Lyons the Fourth International Conference on System Science in Health Care it should not be astonishing
