Although some cancer survivors recover with a renewed sense of life and purpose what has often been ignored is the toll taken by cancer and its treatment on health functioning sense of security and well being. Long lasting effects of treatment may be apparent shortly after its completion or arise years later. The transition from active treatment to post treatment care is critical to long term health. *From Cancer Patient to Cancer Survivor* focuses on survivors of adult cancer during the phase of care that follows primary treatment. The book raises awareness of the medical functional and psychosocial consequences of cancer and its treatment. It defines quality health care for cancer survivors and identifies strategies to achieve it. The book also recommends improvements in the quality of life of cancer survivors through policies that ensure their access to psychosocial services fair employment practices and health insurance. The NCPB identified emerging policy issues in the nation's effort to combat cancer and prepared reports that address those issues including a series of reports on topics ranging from cancer prevention to end of life care.

Clearly there is more research in the most prevalent forms of cancers e.g. breast cancer than others that provide us with guidance on how to optimize their health but there are data on other forms of cancers that can also better inform practice. There may also be general care practices that can cut across cancer types. There has been an emergence of epidemiological and clinical research in cancer survivors that can form the basis for a revolution in the quality and nature of health care that survivors receive. This book not only provides the reader with diverse perspectives and data but also integrates this information so it can serve as the foundation necessary to improve and maintain the health of cancer survivors. Reporting of symptoms to health care providers is a complex multi-determined problem influenced not only by the pathophysiology but also as we have learned over the years through pain research by societal, cultural and biobehavioral factors. In order for us to generate meaningful and effective treatment we need to better understand the symptom experience in cancer survivors.
