Bourgeois, 2012-12-06 The path Husserl entered upon at Bourgeois, 2014-01-15 the beginning of his philosophical writings turned out to be the beginning of a long tedious way Throughout his life he constantly comes to grips with the fundamental problems which set him upon this path Beginning with the logical level of meaning laboring through the idealism of the transcendental phenomenology of the period between Ideas I to the Meditations in search for the ever more originary he finally arrived at the level of the Lebenswelt It was this later focus on the ever more originary the source the foundation of meaning which led him finally to the horizon of meaning and the genesis of meaning in the Lebenswelt period This later period allows for a quasi wedding of his phenomenology with some adaptation of existentialism But this union called for an adaptation of Husserl's logistic prejudice. The period of the Lebenswelt allows many of the later phenomenologists to speak of the failure of the brackets in their extreme exclusion and to allow for a link between man and his world in the Lebenswelt This link is at the source of the ontological investigations and theories which arise from the phenomenological movement However there is the possibility of many tensions in such an endeavor since the study of being can be most abstract and most concrete Paul Ricoeur's Renewal of Philosophical Anthropology Marc de Leeuw, 2021-12-27 In Paul Ricoeur's Renewal of Philosophical Anthropology Vulnerability Capability Justice Marc de Leeuw argues that Ricoeur's philosophical project integrates the anthropological tradition while renewing its importance as a hermeneutic anthropology of human capability Ricoeur posits that our cogito is neither its own absolute master nor fully transparent to itself inflicting a wound bris and fracturing the center of Cartesian self certainty But the Nietzschean disillusionment that ensues does not simply amount to a victorious anti cogito it opens another path towards self understanding In place of the direct route of intuition is found a more complex way forward one guided by interpretation The task of philosophical anthropology is to understand the human through its interpretative critical and imaginative ability as well as its capacity to act towards with and for others the interpretation of the world in front of us the interpretation of who we are and the interpretation of what it means to be among others as other selves coalesces in an anthropology that binds the question of the self to a moral ethical and political project one aiming to reflect our existence in common For Ricoeur the basic question of our subjective and normative standing demands a fundamental response a response toward our own otherness and to responsibilities triggered by the appeal of Others In both cases our vulnerability is inescapable we can never have an absolute self knowledge nor an absolute knowledge of Others Ricoeur turns this fundamental aporia into an affirmative philosophical anthropology of human action attestation and justice Biblical Narrative in the Philosophy of Paul Ricoeur Kevin J.
