Lucas, 1997 The author explores what is known about the medieval publishing process by close study of the work of John Capgrave 1393 1464 a prolific author and one of the most learned Englishmen of his day In the Middle Ages before the age of printing the author was often his own scribe and almost invariably his own editor and publisher Lucas shows how works newly composed by an author were prepared Capgrave's linguistic and scribal usages are set in the socio historical context of the 15th century John Capgrave's Fifteenth Century Karen A. Quinn, 2013 Proposes that Troilus was intended for live performance by Chaucer himself and discusses the use of useless to readers words and phrases the different moods of presentation for each book and the implications for contemporary studies Print Culture and the Medieval Author Alexandra Gillespie, 2006-11-30 Print Culture and the Medieval Author is a book about books Examining hundreds of early printed books and their late medieval analogues Alexandra Gillespie writes a bibliographical history of the poet Geoffrey Chaucer and his follower John Lydgate in the century after the arrival of printing in England Her study is an important new contribution to the emerging sociology of the text in English literary and historical studies At the centre of this study is a familiar question what is an author The idea of the vernacular writer was already contested and unstable in medieval England Gillespie demonstrates that in the late Middle Ages it was also a way for book producers and readers to mediate the risks commercial political religious and imaginative involved in the publication of literary texts Gillespie s discussion focuses on the changes associated with the shift to print scribal precedents for these changes and contemporary understanding of them The treatment of texts associated with Chaucer and Lydgate is an index to the sometimes flexible sometimes resistant responses of book printers copyists decorators distributors patrons censors owners and readers to a gradual but profoundly influential bibliographical transition.
