Georgia Dutch:

The Georgia Dutch George Fenwick Jones, 1992 This is the first comprehensive history of the German speaking settlers who emigrated to the Georgia colony from Germany Alsace Switzerland Austria and adjacent regions Known collectively as the Georgia Dutch they were the colony s most enterprising early settlers and they played a vital role in gaining Britain s toehold in a territory also coveted by Spain and France The main body of the book is a chronological account of the Georgia Dutch from their earliest arrival in 1733 to their dispersal and absorption into what was by 1783 an Anglo American populace Underscoring the harsh daily life of the common settler George Fenwick Jones also highlights noteworthy individuals and events He traces recurrent themes including tensions between the realities of the settlers lives and the aspirations and motivations of the colony s trustees and supporters the web of relations between German and English speaking whites African Americans and Native Americans and early signs of the genesis of a distinctly new and American sensibility Three summary chapters conclude The Georgia Dutch Merging new material with information from previous chapters Jones offers the most complete depiction to date of Georgia Dutch culture and society Included are discussions of religion health and medicine education welfare and charity industry agriculture trade and commerce Native American affairs slavery domestic life and customs the arts and military and legal concerns Based on twenty five years of research with primary documents in Europe and the United States The Georgia Dutch is a welcome reappraisal of an ethnic group whose role in colonial history has over time been unfairly minimized

To Make this Land Our Own Arlin C. Migliazzo, 2007 A case study in the social history of frontier town building set in the swamps of South Carolina On the banks of the lower Savannah River the military objectives of South Carolina officials the ambitions of Swiss entrepreneur Jean Pierre Purry and the dreams of Protestants from Switzerland France Germany Italy and England converged in a planned settlement named Purrysburg This examination of the first South Carolina township in Governor Robert Johnson s strategic plan to populate and defend the colonial backcountry offers the clearest picture to date of the settlement of the colony s Southern frontier by ethnically diverse and contractually obligated immigrants Arlin C Migliazzo contends that the story of Purrysburg Township founded in 1732 and set in the forbidding environment bounded by the Savannah River and the Coosawhatchie swamps challenges the notion that white colonists shed their ethnic distinctions to become a monolithic culture He views Purrysburg as a laboratory in which to observe ethnic phenomena in the colonial and antebellum South Separated by linguistic religious and cultural barriers the migr s adapted familiar social processes from their homelands to create a workable sense of community and identity His work is one of only a handful of examples of what has been deemed the new social history methodology as applied to a South Carolina subject Initially devastated by privation and a high mortality rate Purrysburg residents also suffered the vicissitudes of an indifferent provincial elite the encroachment of lowcountry rice planters Prevost s invasion in 1779 and ultimate destruction of the settlement by Sherman s army Migliazzo details the community s changing military and economic fortunes

the gradual displacement of its residents to neighboring communities the role of African Americans in the region the complex religious life of township settlers and the quirky contributions of Purry s climatological speculations to the fateful siting of this first township

prominent motivator and primary element of social identification and cohesion. Inevitably migrants carried with them traditional skills and other indispensable cultural baggage. A key strength of this book is that contributors emphasize the mutual exchanges that occurred among cultures.

Pietism is a reform movement originating among German Lutherans in the 17th century. It focused on personal faith reacting against Lutheran Church's emphasis on doctrine and theology over Christian living. The movement quickly expanded, exerting an enormous influence on various forms of Christianity and became concerned with social and educational matters. Indeed, Pietists showed a strong interest in issues of social and ecclesial reform, the nature of history and historical inquiry, the shape and purpose of theology and theological education, the missional task of the church, and social justice and political engagement. Though the movement remained largely misunderstood, especially in Anglo-American contexts, negative stereotypes depicted Pietism as a quietist and sectarian form of religion, merely concerned with the pious soul and its God. The main proposal of the editors of this volume is to correct this misunderstanding, assembling a deep collection of essays written by scholars from a variety of fields. Espionage and Enslavement in the Revolution Claire Bellerjeau, Tiffany Yecke Brooks, 2021-05-01. In January 1785 a young African American woman named Elizabeth Liss was put on board the *Lucretia* in New York Harbor bound for Charleston where she would be sold to her fifth enslaver in just twenty-two years. Leaving behind a small child she had little hope of ever seeing again. Elizabeth was faced with the stark reality of being sold south to a life quite different from any she had known before. She had no idea that Robert Townsend, a son of the first family she was enslaved by, would locate her, safeguard her child, and return her to New York, nor that Robert, one of George Washington's most trusted spies, had joined an anti-slavery movement. As Robert and Elizabeth's story unfolds, prominent Revolutionary figures cross their path, including Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, John Jay, Jupiter Hammon, John Andr  and John Adams, as well as participants in the Boston Massacre, the Sons of Liberty, the Battle of Long Island, Franklin's Paris negotiations, and the Benedict Arnold treason plot.
