The Origins of Fascist Ideology 1918-1925 Emilio Gentile, 2013-10-18 This is the first detailed and definitive study of the development and initial success of fascism as it originated in Italy right after the First World War.

Filippo Tommaso Marinetti Ernest Ialongo, 2015-03-06 Filippo Tommaso Marinetti *The Artist and His Politics* explores the politics of the leader of the Futurist art movement. Emerging in Italy in 1909 Futurism sought to propel Italy into the modern world and is famously known for outlandish claims to want to destroy museums and libraries in order to speed this transition. Futurism however also had a much darker political side. It glorified war as the solution to many of Italy's ills and was closely tied to the Fascist Regime. In this book Ialongo focuses on Marinetti as the chief determinant of Futurist politics and explores how a seemingly revolutionary art movement at one point having some support among revolutionary left wing movements in Italy could eventually become so intimately tied to the repressive Fascist regime. Ialongo traces Marinetti's politics from before the foundation of Futurism through the Great War and then throughout the twenty year Fascist dictatorship using a wide range of published and unpublished sources. Futurist politics are presented within the wider context of developments in Italy and Europe and Ialongo further highlights how Marinetti's political choices influenced the art of his movement.

Fascist Modernities Ruth Ben-Ghiat, 2004-03 This cultural history of Mussolini's dictatorship discusses the meanings of modernity in interwar Italy. The work argues that fascism appealed to many Italian intellectuals as a new model of modernity that would resolve the European crisis as well as long standing problems of the national past.

Baroque Fictions Margaret Elizabeth Colvin, 2005 This volume is the first in depth study of the French novelist Marguerite Yourcenar's fiction to contend that the author's texts exhibit in unexpected ways numerous characteristics of the neobaroque. This subversive postmodern aesthetic privileges extravagant artistic play, flux and heterogeneity. In demonstrating the affinity of Yourcenar's texts with the neobaroque the author of this study casts doubt on their presumed transparency and stability qualities associated with the French neoclassical tradition of the past century where the Yourcenarian oeuvre is most often placed. Yourcenar's election to the prestigious tradition bound French Academy in 1981 as its first female immortal cemented her already well established niche in the twentieth century French literary pantheon. A self taught classicist historian and modern day French moralist Yourcenar has been praised for her polished classical style and analyzed for her use of myth and universal themes. While those factors at first seem to justify amply the neoclassical label by which Yourcenar is most widely recognized this study's close reading of four of her fictions

reveals instead the texts opacity and subversive resistance to closure their rejection of stable interpretations and their deconstruction of postmodern Grand Narratives Theirs is a neobaroque logic which stresses the absence of theoretical assurances and the limitations of reason The coincidence of the new millennium which in so many ways reflects Yourcenar's disquieting vision and her centenary in 2003 affords not so much an excuse to reject the author's neoclassical label but rather the obligation to reassess it in light of contemporary discourses This study will be of interest to students of twentieth century French fiction and comparative literature especially that of the latter half of the twentieth century

The Historic Imaginary Claudio Fogu, 2003-01-01 Focusing on both ritual and mass visual representations of history in 1920s and 1930s Italy *The Historic Imaginary* unveils how Italian Fascism sought to institutionalize a modernist culture of history The study takes a new historicist and microhistorical approach to cultural intellectual history integrating theoretical tools of analysis acquired from visual cultural studies art history linguistics and reception theory in a sophisticated examination of visual modes of historical representation from commemorations to monuments to exhibitions and mass media spanning the entire period of the Italian fascist regime Claudio Fogu argues that the fascist historic imaginary was intellectually rooted in the actualist philosophy of history elaborated by Giovanni Gentile culturally grounded in Latin Catholic rhetorical codes and aimed at overcoming both Marxist and liberal conceptions of the relationship between historical agency representation and consciousness The book further proposes that this modernist vision of history was a core element of fascist ideology encapsulated by the famous Mussolinian motto that fascism makes history rather than writing it and that its institutionalization constituted a key point of intersection between the fascist aesthetization and sacralization of politics The author finally claims that his study of fascist historic culture opens the way to an understanding and re evaluation of the historical relationship between the modernist critique of historical consciousness and the rise of post modernist forms of temporality

Mussolini's Rome B. Painter, 2016-01-13 In 1922 the Fascist March on Rome brought Benito Mussolini to power He promised Italians that his fascist revolution would unite them as never before and make Italy a strong and respected nation internationally In the next two decades Mussolini set about rebuilding the city of Rome as the site and symbol of the new fascist Italy Through an ambitious program of demolition and construction he sought to make Rome a modern capital of a nation and an empire worthy of Rome's imperial past Building the new Rome put people to work liberated ancient monuments cleared slums produced new cities for education sports and cinema produced wide new streets and provided the regime with a setting to showcase fascism's dynamism power and greatness Mussolini's Rome thus embodied the movement the man and the myth that made up fascist Italy

Walter Benjamin and the Aesthetics of Power Lutz Peter Koepnick, 1999-01-01 Walter Benjamin and the Aesthetics of Power explores Walter Benjamin's seminal writings on the relationship between mass culture and fascism. The book offers a nuanced reading of Benjamin's widely influential critique of aesthetic politics while it contributes to current debates about the cultural projects of Nazi Germany, the changing role of popular culture in the twentieth century, and the way in which Nazi aesthetics have persisted into the present. Lutz Koepnick first explores the development of the aestheticization thesis in Benjamin's work from the early 1920s to his death in 1940. Pushing Benjamin's fragmentary remarks to a logical conclusion, Koepnick sheds light on the ways in which the Nazis employed industrial mass culture to redress the political as a self-referential space of authenticity and self-assertion. Although Koepnick insists on crucial differences between the stage-managing of political action in modern and postmodern societies, he argues throughout that it is in Benjamin's emphatic insistence on experience that we may find the relevance of his reflections today. *Walter Benjamin and the Aesthetics of Power* is both an important contribution to Benjamin studies and a revealing addition to our understanding of the Third Reich and of contemporary culture's uneasy relationship to Nazi culture.
