nonnormative bodies reallocating medical and narrative agency to bodies considered otherwise powerless Each chapter pairs a trope with a critical medical debate granting silenced bodies power over their own narratives the reanimated corpse confronts fears about vitalism the skeleton exposes fears about pain the unreliable corpse feeds on fears of dissection the devil redirects fears about disability the dangerous narrative manipulates fears of contagion and vaccination
