Education and Society in Nineteenth-Century Nottingham David Wardle, 2010-06-24 An account of the progress made in the provision of education in Nottingham in the nineteenth century Dr Wardle makes full use of the evidence of newspapers contemporary accounts and statistics relating to population child employment public health welfare agencies and charitable organisations to produce an integrated study of the educational social and economic aspects of a town's growth over 100 years The experience of Nottingham is compared generally favourably with that of other cities The full use of newspapers means that areas of the educational picture usually overlooked are here given due prominence for example the numerically significant private schools and the lending libraries organised by groups of workmen This book gives a vivid picture of the growth of our educational system not only as it was seen by the administrators but also as it was seen by the parents and pupils for whom it was intended *The Politics of Working-class Education in Britain, 1830-50* Denis G. Richardson, William Henry Chaloner, 1996 *The Rise of Popular Literacy in Victorian England* David Mitch, 2016-11-11 In early Victorian England there was an intense debate about whether government involvement in the provision of popular elementary education was appropriate Government did in the end become actively involved first in the administration of schools and in the supervision of instruction then in establishing and administering compulsory schooling laws After a century of stagnation literacy rates rose markedly While increasing government involvement would seem to provide the most obvious explanation for this rise

David F Mitch seeks to demonstrate that in fact popular demand was also an important force behind the growth in literacy. Although previous studies have looked at public policy in detail and although a few have considered popular demand, *The Rise of Popular Literacy in Victorian England* is the first book to bring together a detailed examination of the two sets of factors. Mitch compares the relative importance of the rise of popular demand for literacy and the development of educational policy measures by the church and state as contributing factors that led to the rise of working class literacy during the Victorian period. He uses an economic historical approach based on an examination of changes in the costs and benefits of acquiring literacy. Mitch considers the initial demand of the working classes for literacy and how much that demand grew. He also examines how literacy rates were influenced by the development of a national system of elementary school provision and by the establishment of compulsory schooling laws. Mitch uses quantitative methods and evidence as well as more traditional historical sources such as government reports, employment ads, and contemporary literature. The role of the public school, he suggests, was social rather than academic, and as such their power and influence is to be interpreted principally in relation to the growth of new social elites, the concept of public service, and the needs of the empire for a bureaucratic ruling class. Only in the modern progressive movement, launched by Cecil Reddie, and the private provision for young women was lasting progress made. Even before the 1902 Education Act, however, the State had spent much time and effort regulating and

reforming the old educational endowments and it is in these initiatives that the foundations for the public provision of secondary educational reform are to be found

Cannell, 2001-01-01 Mathematicians and lay people alike will enjoy this fascinating book that details the life of George Green a pioneer in the application of mathematics to physical problems Green was a mathematical physicist who spent most of the first 40 years of his life working not as a physicist but as a miller in his father's grain mill Green received only four terms of formal schooling and at the age of nine he had surpassed his teachers Green studied mathematics in his spare time and in 1828 published his most famous work An Essay on the Application of Mathematical Analysis to the Theories of Electricity and Magnetism It was in this essay that the famous Green's Theorem and Green's functions first appeared Although this work was largely ignored during his lifetime it is now considered of major importance in modern physics
