The Lieutenant Governors of British Columbia, 2019-05-18 The office of lieutenant governor has been a constant in British Columbia from the province's colonial beginnings to the modern era Originally tasked with selecting the province's premier giving royal assent to provincial legislation and invested with the power to dismiss governments the role of the Crown's representative has continually evolved to meet the needs of society Today the office's constitutional powers largely focus on community functions but the role of lieutenant governor is more than ceremonial This was demonstrated after the 2017 provincial election when then Lieutenant Governor Judith Guichon accepted Premier Christy Clark's resignation and asked NDP leader John Horgan to attempt to form government rather than call a new election BC's early lieutenant governors were the force behind infrastructure initiatives such as building roads railways and ships and investing in electric utilities and the forest industry Although most came from the ranks of the British elite and often espoused policies that denied First Nations

land rights and opposed the immigration of Chinese and Japanese people over time the office became more representative of the province's diverse population. In recent years lieutenant governors have played an increasingly activist role celebrating cultural excellence and promoting literacy, creativity, environmental awareness. Chinese Canadian David Lam (1988-95) had a mandate of intercultural understanding. Iona Campagnolo (2001-7) the first woman to hold the position in BC focused on empowering youth and women and fostering a spirit of public inclusiveness at Government House, Steven Point. (2007-12) BC's first Indigenous lieutenant governor worked to establish libraries in First Nations communities. Chronologically arranged and rich with photographs, this work by historian Jenny Clayton paints a vivid picture of the lives of BC's thirty lieutenant governors. Clayton's biographical essays capture the distinct personalities and events that have characterized the office from 1871 to the present, offering a unique perspective on the evolution of the province.

for librarians in Canada and for those who aspire to become librarians it is also for deans directors and faculty of libraries and library schools managers and supervisors in libraries human resources personnel and other decision makers in the field It will also appeal to researchers interested in race relations multiculturalism intercultural communications and management cross cultural communications and management cross cultural studies diversity Aboriginal peoples indigenous populations and ethnic or visible minorities The majority of the chapters written by visible minority librarians come from those born outside of Canada They speak of their love for their new country its generosity and support towards newcomers and immigrants and their reasons for taking up the library profession While few of the librarians speak of open racism they narrate their experiences as those filled with challenges self doubt and courage Several of the Aboriginal librarians who contributed to this book have worked within tribal communities and tribal libraries In spite of working within community environments they have experienced challenges especially related to lack of funding These librarians speak of having to deal with tokenism lack of mentorship and working in professional isolation Some of them narrate their challenges in working with colleagues who do not relate to them Lack of support is common as many organizations do not have proper strategies to deal with discrimination However these chapters end with a positive note of encouragement for future librarians the authors encourage all librarians to be engaged find trusted mentors seek help when needed focus on professional development and find a niche in the organization
