J. Marshall, 2019-07-04 Edmund Burke was both a political thinker of the utmost importance and an active participant in the day to day business of politics It is the latter role that is the concern of this book showing Burke engaging with issues concerning the West Indies which featured so largely in British concerns in the later eighteenth century Initially Burke saw the islands as a means by which his close connections might make their fortunes later he was concerned with them as a great asset to be managed in the national interest and finally he became a participant in debates about the slave trade This volume adds a new dimension to assessments of Burke's views on empire hitherto largely

confined to Ireland India and America and explores the complexities of his response to slavery The system outraged his abundantly attested concern for the suffering caused by abuses of British power overseas but one which he also recognised to be fundamental for sustaining the wealth generated by the West Indies which he deemed essential to Britain's national power He therefore sought compromises in the gradual reform of the system rather than immediate abolition of the trade or emancipation of the slaves

Edmund Burke, Volume II F. P. Lock, 2006-09-07 This is the second and concluding volume of a biography of Edmund Burke 1730-97 a key figure in eighteenth century British and Irish politics and intellectual life Covering the most interesting years of his life 1784-97 its leading themes are India and the French Revolution Burke was largely responsible for the impeachment of Warren Hastings former Governor General of Bengal The lengthy 145 day trial of Hastings which lasted from 1788 to 1795 is recognized as a landmark episode in the history of Britain's relationship with India Lock provides the first day by day account of the entire trial highlighting some of the many disputes about evidence as well as the great set speeches by Burke and others In 1790 Burke published *Reflections on the Revolution in France* the earliest sustained attack on the principles of the Revolution Continuously in print ever since the *Reflections* remains the most widely read and quoted book about the Revolution The *Reflections* was followed by a series of anti revolutionary writings as Burke maintained his crusade against the Revolution to the end of his life In addition to these leading themes the biography examines many other topics in its coverage of Burke's busy and varied life his parliamentary career his family friendships and philanthropy and his often difficult and obsessive personality There are more than thirty illustrations including many contemporary caricatures that convey how Burke was perceived by an often hostile and uncomprehending public Controversial in his time Burke is now regarded as one of the greatest of orators in the English language as well as one of the most influential political philosophers in the Western tradition

Edmund Burke and Ireland Luke Gibbons, 2003-10-16 This pioneering study of Burke's engagement with Irish politics and culture argues that Burke's influential early writings on aesthetics are intimately connected to his lifelong political concerns The concept of the sublime which lay at the heart of his aesthetics addressed itself primarily to the experience of terror and it is this spectre that haunts Burke's political imagination throughout his career Luke Gibbons argues that this found expression in his preoccupation with political terror whether in colonial Ireland and India or revolutionary America and France Burke's preoccupation with violence sympathy and pain allowed him to explore the dark side of the Enlightenment but from a position no less committed to the plight of the oppressed and to political emancipation This major reassessment of a key political and cultural figure will appeal to Irish studies and Post Colonial specialists political theorists and Romanticists
