Ellen Terry, Player in Her Time Nina Auerbach, 1997-01-29 Nina Auerbach brilliantly reveals the Ellen Terry whose roles on stage and off embodied everything that a rapidly changing world exhorted women to be **Henry Irving** Richard Foulkes, 2017-11-30 Henry Irving 1838 1905 the first actor to be knighted dominated the theatre in Britain and beyond for over a quarter of a century As an actor he was strikingly different with his idiosyncratic pronunciation his somewhat ungainly physique and his brilliant psychological portrayals of virtue and villainy As a director of spectacular and commercially driven entertainments Irving anticipated Hollywood directors from D W Griffith to Stephen Spielberg And as manager of the Lyceum Theatre where audiences included the leading public figures of the day he controlled every aspect of the performance This collection of essays by leading theatre scholars explores each element of Irving's art his acting his contribution to the plays he commissioned his flair for the stage picture and his ear for incidental music Like Wagner Irving was a proponent of a holistic approach to the stage that is blending together acting painting music and architecture to create harmonious balanced and artistic theatre Irving emerges not only as the peer of such eminent contemporaries as Tennyson Sullivan Shaw and Burne Jones but also as a powerful influence on the twentieth century theatre Chloroformist Christine Ball, 2021-08-03 Operating with bare hands dressed in his street clothes he had taken those first steps that every training surgeon must take gripping the handle of a scalpel and making the first irrevocable cut into live human flesh For the surgeon training in the early 1840s these first surgical milestones were performed on a person who would recoil in terror and horror flinch pull away shake and scream and scream and scream Until 1846 surgery was performed without anaesthesia extraordinary operations carried out on conscious terrified patients Surgeons of that era were bold and courageous and saved many lives but anaesthesia changed everything With an unconscious patient the surgeon could take his time Surgery became slower more careful and more delicate And as anaesthesia removed the pain of surgery the medical world gave more attention to surgical infection heralding in the use of antiseptics and eventually aseptic surgery By 1881 the operating theatre was unrecognisable Much has been written about surgery in the nineteenth century but little has been said about the development of the relationship between surgeon and anaesthetist For anaesthesia to mature and allow further advances in surgery a professional relationship had to develop between surgeons and anaesthetists Joseph Clover arguably did more than any other anaesthetist to develop that relationship In The Chloroformist Christine Ball tells the captivating story of an innovative hard working and deeply humane pioneer of modern patient care **The Art of the Pose** Heather Marcovitch, 2010 This book revisits Oscar Wilde's major writings through the field of performance studies Wilde wrote about performance as a cultural dialectic as a form of serious and critical play and as the basis of a subversive poetics In his studies at Oxford University his famous lecture tour of the United States and Canada his friendships with famous actresses Sarah Bernhardt and Lillie Langtry the writing of his critical essays *The Picture of Dorian Gray* *Salome* and his society comedies

and culminating in his post prison writings *De Profundis* and *The Ballad of Reading Gaol* Wilde develops a rich theory of performance that addresses aesthetics ethics identity and individualism This book also traces Wilde s often troubled relationship with late Victorian society in terms of its attempts to define his public performances by stereotyping him as both irrelevant and dangerous from the early newspaper caricatures to its later description of him as a sexual monster

Victorian actress was largely defined by her negotiation with the sculptural metaphor and that this was authorized and determined by the Ovidian myth of Pygmalion and Galatea Drawing on evidence of theatrical fictions visual representations and popular culture's assimilation of the sculptural image as well as theatrical productions she examines some of the manifestations of the sculptural metaphor on the legitimate English stage and its implications for the actress in the later nineteenth century Within the legitimate theatre the Galatea aesthetic positioned actresses as predominantly visual and sexual commodities whose opportunities for interpretative engagement with their plays were minimal This dominant aesthetic was effectively challenged only at the end of the century with the advent of the New drama and the emergence of a body of autobiographical writings by actresses

Tragic Muse Rachel Brownstein, 2013-05-01 Rachel Felix 1821-58 the homely daughter of poor Jewish peddlers was the first stage actress to achieve international stardom and the last person one would have expected to resurrect the cultural patrimony of France Yet her passionate startling performances of the works of Racine and Corneille saved them from almost certain obsolescence after the fall of Napoleon who had relished classical French tragedy and the emergence of Romanticism Audiences in Paris London Boston and Moscow thrilled

to her voice and devoured the rumors of her offstage promiscuity and extravagance Her fame equal parts popularity and notoriety was so great that she could nonchalantly dispose of her last name La grande Rachel virtually invented the role of the superstar while remaining a symbol of the highest art and most serious cultural pursuits Indeed her identity was fraught with such contradictions which intrigued the public all the more From the moment she was discovered playing the guitar on the streets of Lyons to her debut on the Parisian stage at the age of fifteen to her critical and commercial triumphs as Camille Phedre and other tormented women Rachel s career was exhaustively managed A series of theater gurus influential reviewers and impresarios including her brash and opportunistic father claimed the credit for her astonishing success What this abundance of male managers has always obscured is Rachel s own decisiveness and control over her time and money not only did she play her various champions and high profile lovers against one another she openly defied them Some called her stubborn even perverse in these pages we come to recognize her as a woman ahead of her time a charismatic individual very much in charge of her own destiny As her fascination with all things Napoleonic suggests Rachel liked power both personal and professional and had the talent to command it
