Freedom Katrin Flikschuh, 2013-04-23 In this engaging new book Katrin Flikschuh offers an accessible introduction to divergent conceptions of freedom in contemporary liberal political philosophy Beginning with a discussion of Isaiah Berlin's seminal distinction between negative and positive liberty the book goes on to consider Gerald MacCallum's alternative proposal of freedom as a triadic concept The abiding influence of Berlin's argument on the writings of contemporary liberal philosophers such as Robert Nozick Hillel Steiner Ronald Dworkin and Joseph Raz is fully explored in subsequent chapters Flikschuh shows that instead of just one negative and one positive freedom tradition contemporary liberal thinkers articulate the meaning and significance of liberal freedom in many different and often conflicting ways What should we make of such diversity and disagreement Should it undermine our confidence in the coherence of liberal freedom Should we strive towards greater conceptual and normative unity Flikschuh argues that moral and political disagreement about freedom can often be traced back to differences in underlying metaphysical presuppositions and commitments Yet these differences do not show liberal freedom debates to be confused or incoherent On the contrary they demonstrate the centrality of this philosophically elusive idea to the continued vitality of liberal political thinking

Troubling Freedom Natasha Lightfoot, 2015-11-19 In 1834 Antigua became the only British colony in the Caribbean to

move directly from slavery to full emancipation Immediate freedom however did not live up to its promise as it did not guarantee any level of stability or autonomy and the implementation of new forms of coercion and control made it in many ways indistinguishable from slavery In *Troubling Freedom* Natasha Lightfoot tells the story of how Antigua's newly freed black working people struggled to realize freedom in their everyday lives prior to and in the decades following emancipation She presents freedpeople's efforts to form an efficient workforce acquire property secure housing worship and build independent communities in response to elite prescriptions for acceptable behavior and oppression Despite its continued efforts Antigua's black population failed to convince whites that its members were worthy of full economic and political inclusion By highlighting the diverse ways freedpeople defined and created freedom through quotidian acts of survival and occasional uprisings Lightfoot complicates conceptions of freedom and the general narrative that landlessness was the primary constraint for newly emancipated slaves in the Caribbean

Generations of Freedom Nik Ribianszky, 2021-03-31 In *Generations of Freedom* Nik Ribianszky employs the lenses of gender and violence to examine family community and the tenacious struggles by which free blacks

claimed and maintained their freedom under shifting international governance from Spanish colonial rule 1779-95 through American acquisition 1795 and eventual statehood established in 1817 and finally to slavery's legal demise in 1865. Freedom was not necessarily a permanent condition but one separated from racial slavery by a permeable and highly unstable boundary. This book explicates how the interlocking categories of race, class, and gender shaped Natchez, Mississippi's free community of color and how implicit and explicit violence carried down from one generation to another. To demonstrate this, Ribianszky introduces the concept of generational freedom. Inspired by the work of Ira Berlin, who focused on the complex process through which free Africans and their descendants came to experience enslavement, generational freedom is an analytical tool that employs this same idea in reverse to trace how various generations of free people of color embraced, navigated, and protected their tenuous freedom. This approach allows for the identification of a foundational generation of free people of color: those who were born into slavery but later freed. The generations that followed the conditional generations were those who were born free and without the experience of and socialization into North America's system of chattel racial slavery. Notwithstanding one's status at birth as legally free or unfree, though each individual's continued freedom was based on compliance with a demanding and often unfair system. *Generations of Freedom* tells the stories of people who collectively inhabited an uncertain world of qualified freedom. Taken together by exploring the themes of movement, gendered violence, and threats to their property and indeed their very bodies, these accounts argue that free blacks were active in shaping their own freedom and that of generations thereafter. Their successful navigation of the shifting ground of freedom was dependent on their utilization of all available tools at their disposal, securing reliable and influential allies, maintaining their independence, and using the legal system to protect their property, including that most precious themselves.

Liberty Worth the Name Gideon Yaffe, 2021-05-11. This is the first comprehensive interpretation of John Locke's solution to one of philosophy's most enduring problems: free will and the nature of human agency. Many assume that Locke defines freedom as merely the dependency of conduct on our wills. And it is precisely this connection between the will and personal identity that reveals the special sense in which our voluntary actions can be attributed to us and the special sense in which we are active with respect to them.
