Fernández, Achy Obejas, and Cristina García; the playwright Eduardo Machado; the poet Rafael Campo; and musical performers Albita Rodríguez and Celia Cruz. Ortíz charts the legacies of sexism and homophobia in patriarchal Cuban culture as well as their influence on Cuban revolutionary and Cuban exile ideologies. Moving beyond the outdated cultural terms of the Cold War, he looks forward to envision queer futures for Cuban American culture free from the ties to restrictive, indeed oppressive, constructions of nation, place, language, and desire.
