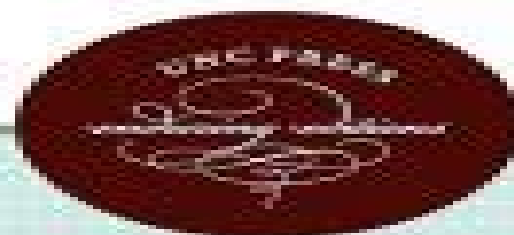

conventions of literary Romanticism that encode women's marginality. Set in the wilderness that surrounded the Great Lakes, these stories revise male literary texts to clear a space where women's voices can be heard. In a group of stories set in the post-Civil War south, women artists are shown as exiles both away from their homes and from themselves. One superb tale, Felipa, pairs a repressed woman artist with a wild child who rejects both patriarchal religion and approved heterosexual behavior. Woolson here explores the possibility of a collaboration between female wildness and female form of control. Stories written during Woolson's years in Europe confront woman artists with successful male writers and critics who resemble Henry James. These carefully crafted stories reflect James's mixed impact on women artists as a model literary realist and as a subtle denigrator of women's talent. Joan Weimar's introduction uses unpublished letters to reconstruct and interpret Woolson's life and her probable suicide. It places Woolson in the male and female literary traditions of her time and offers extended analysis of the stories. During the long nineteenth century British women reframed the masculine paradigm of the Grand Tour They created a feminist travel gaze intentionally or unintentionally that differed from that of male peers Unlike their brothers who went for personal edification women with means left their English homes for the great Italian cities of Florence Naples and Rome to escape personal disappointments and the social limitations imposed by parents spouses and society The anonymity of travel to a distant land and new freedoms fostered political and creative achievements including entrepreneurial journalism literary masterpieces and social advocacy for their gender which redefined the contours of the Anglo Italian cultural landscape The historical evidence presented here testifies to the life changing capacity of travel and firmly demonstrates how British women s history and literature enriches and broadens narratives about Britain and the World

Victorian Poetry and Modern Life Natasha Moore, 2015-12-26 Faced with the chaos and banality of modern everyday life a number of Victorian poets sought innovative ways of writing about the unpoetic present in their verse Their varied efforts are recognisably akin not least in their development of mixed verse forms that fused novel and epic to create something equal to the miscellaneousness of the age

Women's Albums and Photography in Victorian England Patrizia Di Bello, 2017-07-05 This beautifully illustrated study recaptures the rich history of women photographers and image collectors in nineteenth century England Situating the practice of collecting exchanging and displaying photographs and other images in the context of feminine sociability Patrizia Di Bello shows that albums express Victorian women's experience of modernity The albums of individual women and the broader feminine culture of collecting and displaying images are examined uncovering the cross references and fertilizations between women's albums and illustrated periodicals and demonstrating the way albums and photography itself were represented in women's magazines fashion plates and popular novels Bringing a sophisticated eye to overlooked images such as the family photograph Di Bello not only illustrates their significance as historical documents but elucidates the visual rhetorics at play In doing so she identifies the connections between Victorian album making and the work of modern day amateurs and artists who use digital techniques to compile and decorate albums with Victorian style borders and patterns At a time when photographic album making is being revitalised by digital technologies this book rewrites the history of photographic albums placing the female collector at its centre and offering an alternative history of photography focused on its uses rather than on its aesthetic or artistic considerations It is remarkable in elegantly connecting the history of photography with the fields of material culture and women's studies

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
