about the responsibility of mentally ill offenders in general Elliott looks at specific mental illnesses in detail among them schizophrenia manic depressive disorders psychosexual disorders such as exhibitionism and voyeurism personality disorders and impulse control disorders such as kleptomania and pyromania He takes a particularly hard look at the psychopath or sociopath who many have argued is incapable of understanding morality Making extensive use of psychiatric case histories Elliott explores the various ways in which mental illness can affect a person's intentions and thus excuse him or her from moral responsibility

Pilgrims in Medicine: Conscience, Legalism and Human Rights Thomas Alured Faunce, 2005-01-01 This arrestingly novel work develops a normative synthesis of medical humanities virtue ethics medical ethics health law and human rights It presents an ambitious complex and coherent argument for the reconceptualisation of the doctor patient relationship and its regulation utilising approaches often thought of as being separate if not opposed virtue based ethics and universal human rights The case is argued gracefully with moderation but also with respect for opposing positions The book's analysis of the foundational professional virtue of therapeutic loyalty is an original departure from the traditional discourse of patient autonomy and the ethical and legal duties of the medical practitioner The central argument is not merely presented as bookends in the introduction and conclusion It is cogently represented in each chapter and section and measured against the material considered A remarkable feature is the use of aptly selected canonical literature to inform the argument These

references run from Hesse's *The Glass Bead Game* in the abstract to Joyce's *Ulysses* in the conclusion. They include excerpts from and discussion about Bergman, Borges, Boswell, Tolstoy, de Beauvoir, Chekhov, Dostoevsky, Samuel Johnson, Aristotle, Orwell, Osler, Chaucer, Schweitzer, Shakespeare, Thorwalds, Kafka, and William Carlos Williams. Such references are used not merely as an artistic and decorative leitmotif but become a critical narrative element and another complex and rich layer to this work. The breadth and quality of the references are testimony to the author's clear understanding of the modern law and literature movement. This work provides the basis of a medical school course. As many medical educators as possible should also be encouraged to read this work for the insights it will give them into using their own personal life narratives and those of their patients to inform their decision making process. This thesis will also be of value to the judiciary whose members are often called upon to make normatively difficult judgments about medical care and medical rules. The human rights material leads to a hopeful view of an international movement toward a universal synthesis between medical ethics and human rights in all doctor-patient relationships.

Belmont Revisited James F. Childress, Eric M. Meslin, Harold T. Shapiro, 2005-10-03
Research with human subjects has long been controversial because of the conflicts that often arise between promoting scientific knowledge and protecting the rights and welfare of subjects. Twenty-five years ago the National Commission for the Protection of Human Subjects of Biomedical and Behavioral Research addressed these conflicts. The result was the Belmont Report, *Ethical Principles and Guidance for Research Involving Human Subjects*, a report that identified foundational principles for ethical research with human subjects: respect for persons, beneficence, and justice. Effect of Cancer On Quality of Life David Osoba, 2021-11-01

The first six chapters deal with conceptual issues relating to measuring quality of life in adult and pediatric populations with cancer. Five chapters review the results of studies using selected quality of life measures and provide recent information on their performance.
