From Our Own Correspondent Polly Hope, 2020-06-11 For more than sixty five years on the air From Our Own Correspondent has been one of BBC Radio 4's flagship programmes. It has taken listeners to parts of the world where they have never gone and perhaps never would: war zones, refugee camps, elite universities, space stations, spy academies and lions dens of all sorts. Its dispatches introduce audiences to people they might never expect to meet: kingpins, revolutionaries, assassins and outcasts. It has always relied on the power of personal testimony, with its contributors not merely reporting the news but sharing what they found out along the way and how it felt. Its correspondents often relate the unexpected: the day they visited the town that is crazy about trout fishing, attended a forty-course Chinese banquet, experienced zero gravity on a flight with Russian cosmonauts, went mud wrestling in Turkey or ballroom dancing in Cameroon. Lincoln's Journalist Michael Burlingame, 2006-08-09 In the Civil War White House John Hay became the ultimate insider the man who had the president's ear Only an extremely small number of persons ever saw Abraham Lincoln both day and night in public as well as private settings from 1860 to 1864 notes Wayne C Temple chief deputy director Illinois State Archives And only one of them had the literary flair of John Milton Hay The most privileged of reporters Hay sent out dispatches and editorials that shed direct as well as indirect light on Lincoln With ample access to the president Hay was in a position to report his words and deeds as well as to offer opinions that may have reflected Lincoln's own views Indeed Burlingame suggests that Lincoln influenced Hay to write and place the articles in northern newspapers Burlingame takes great pains to establish authorship of the items reproduced here He convincingly demonstrates that the essays and letters written for the Providence Journal the Springfield Illinois State Journal and the St Louis Missouri Democrat under the pseudonym Ecarte are the work of Hay Additionally he finds much circumstantial and stylistic evidence that Hay wrote as our special correspondent for the Washington World and for the St Louis Missouri Republican Easily identifiable Hay's style was marked by long sentences baroque syntactical architecture immense vocabulary verbal pyrotechnics cocksure tone combining acid contempt and extravagant praise offbeat adverbs and scornful adjectives

Cities of the Mediterranean Meltem Toksoz, Biray Kolluoglu, 2014-08-25 The Eastern Mediterranean is one of the world's most vibrant and vital commercial centres and for centuries the region's cities and ports have been at the heart of East West trade Taking a full and comprehensive look at the region as a whole rather than isolating individual cities or distinct cultures Cities of the Mediterranean offers a fresh and original portrait of the entire region from the 16th century to the present In this ambitious inter disciplinary study the authors examine the relationships between the Eastern Mediterranean port cities and their hinterlands as well as inland and provincial cities from many different perspectives political economic international and ecological without prioritising either Ottoman Anatolia or the Ottoman Balkans or the Arab provinces in order to think of the Eastern Mediterranean world as a coherent whole Wide ranging in scope Cities of the Mediterranean explores diverse topics weaving together history sociology geography cartography politics and economics Early chapters examine the impact of the Little Ice Age the global economy's shift from the Mediterranean to Antwerp and Amsterdam early European perceptions of the Eastern Mediterranean 19th century harbour building practices and their impact on the cities and the connections between Alexandria Izmir and Thessalonica and their vast and diverse hinterlands The book also explores political radicalism in Turkey and elsewhere as well as the illegal trade networks that linked the Balkans and Adriatic with the Mediterranean and the introduction of new technologies that led to the faster transport of people goods and information Through its penetrating analysis of the various networks that connected the ports and towns of the Mediterranean and their inhabitants throughout the Ottoman period Cities of the Mediterranean presents the region as a

unified and dynamic community and paves the way for a new understanding of the subject

The Crimean War William Howard Russell, 2009-05-01 Armed with only a telescope a watch and a notebook he retrieved from a dead soldier William Howard Russell spent twenty two months reporting from the trenches for the Times of London during the Crimean War A novice in a new field of journalism war reporting when he first set off for Crimea in 1854 the young Irishman returned home a veteran of three bloody battles having survived the siege of Sebastopol and watched a colleague die of cholera Russell's fine eye for detail electrified readers and his remarkably colorful and hugely significant accounts of battles provided those at home for the first time ever with a realistic picture of the brutality of war The Crimean War originally published in 1856 under the title The Complete History of the Russian War presents a selection of Russell's dispatches as well as those of other embedded reporters providing a ground eye view of the conflict as depicted in British newspapers Fought on the southern tip of the Crimea from 1853 to 1856 the Crimean War raged on far longer than either side expected largely because of mismanagement and disease more soldiers died from cholera typhus typhoid dysentery and scurvy than battle wounds Russell's biting criticisms of incompetent military authorities and an antiquated military system contributed to the collapse of the contemporary ruling party in Britain In his reports Russell wrote extensively about inept medical care for the wounded which he termed human barbarity Thanks to compelling accounts by Russell and others authorities allowed Florence Nightingale to enter the war zone and nurse troops back to health The Crimean War contains reports from military men who acted as part time reporters articles by professional journalists and letters from others at the front that newspapers back home later published Rapidly pulled together by American publisher John G Wells the volume presents a fascinating contemporary analysis of the war by those on the ground This reissue offers a new introduction by Angela Michelli Fleming and John Maxwell Hamilton that places these reports in context and highlights the critical role they played during a pivotal point in European history The first first hand accounts of the realities of war these dispatches set the tone for future independent war reporting

1923 Mark William Jones, 2023-08-29 How Germany's fledgling democracy nearly collapsed in 1923 and how pro democracy forces fought back In 1923 the Weimar Republic faced a series of crises including foreign occupation of its industrial heartland rampant inflation radical violence and finally Hitler's infamous beer hall putsch Fanning the flames of anti government and anti Semitic sentiment the Nazis tried to violently seize power in Munich only failing after they were abandoned by like minded conservatives In 1923 historian Mark William Jones draws on new research to offer a revealing portrait of German politics and society in this turbulent year Tracing Hitler's early rise Jones reveals how political pragmatism and unprecedented international cooperation with the West brought Germany out of its crisis year Although Germany would succumb to tyranny a decade later the story of the republic's survival in 1923 offers essential lessons to anyone concerned about the future of democracy today

The Gang Frederic Milton Thrasher, 2013-03-27 While gangs and gang culture have been around for countless centuries *The Gang* is one of the first academic studies of the phenomenon Originally published in 1927 Frederic Milton Thrasher's magnum opus offers a profound and careful analysis of hundreds of gangs in Chicago in the early part of the twentieth century With rich prose and an eye for detail Thrasher looked specifically at the way in which urban geography shaped gangs and posited the thesis that neighborhoods in flux were more likely to produce gangs Moreover he traced gang culture back to feudal and medieval power systems and linked tribal ethos in other societies to codes of honor and glory found in American gangs Thrasher approaches his subject with empathy and insightfulness and creates a multifaceted and textured portrait that still has much to offer to readers today With handsome images that evoke the era this unabridged edition of *The Gang* not only explores an important moment in the history of Chicago but also is itself a landmark in the history of sociology and subcultural theory
