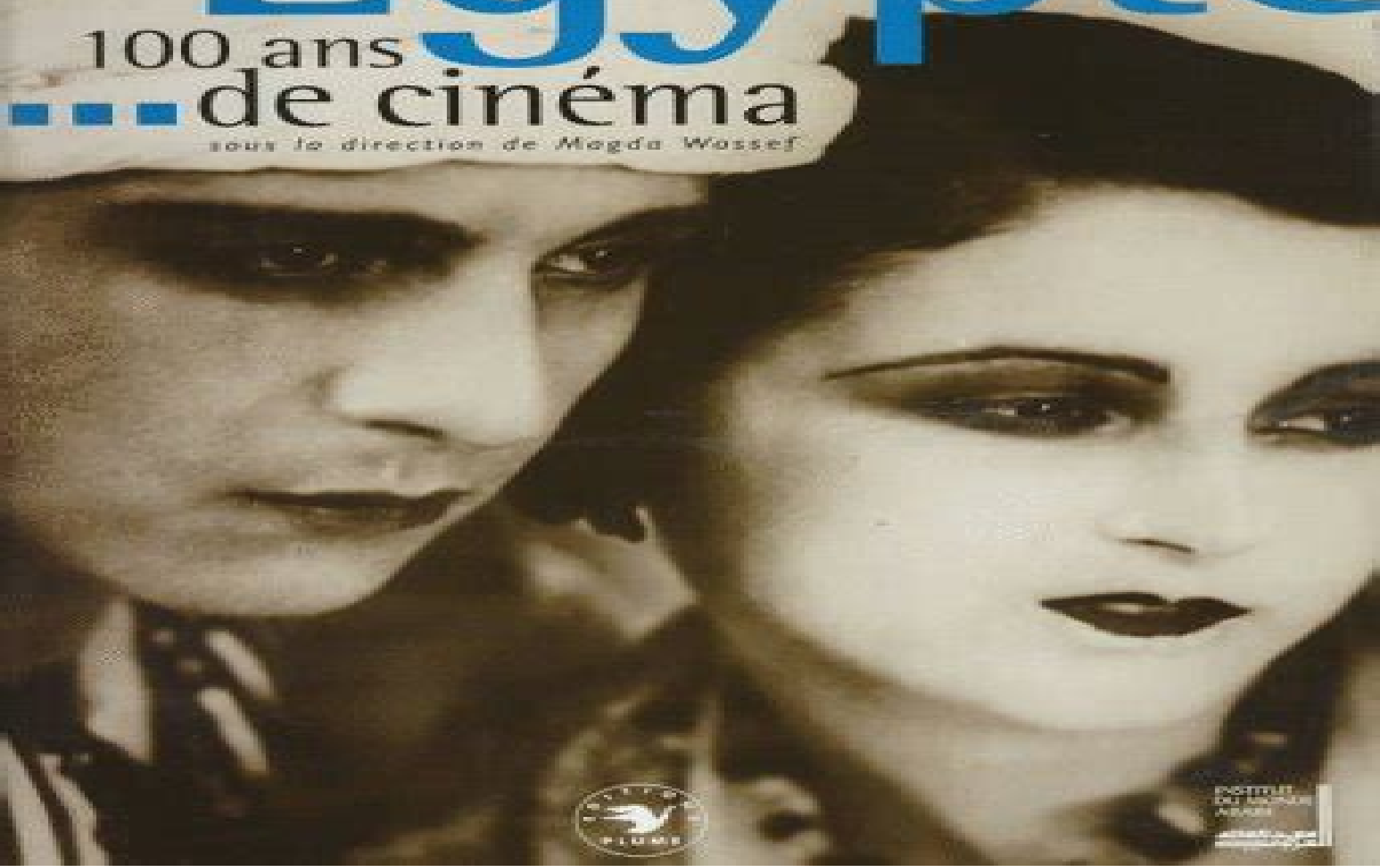

## **Egypte 100 Ans De Cinema:**

*Re-envisioning Egypt 1919-1952* Arthur Goldschmidt, Amy J. Johnson, Barak A. Salmoni, 2005 *Re Envisioning Egypt 1919 1952* presents new and often dismissed aspects of the constitutional monarchy era in Egyptian history. It demonstrates that many of the domestic and regional sociopolitical and cultural changes credited to the 1952 revolutionaries actually began in the decades before the July coup. Arguing against the predominant view of the pre revolutionary era in Egypt as one of creeping decay, the volume restores understandings of the 1919-1952 years as integral to modern nation state formation and social transformation. The book's contributors show that Egypt's real revolutions were long term processes emerging over several decades prior to 1952. The leaders of the 1952 coup capitalized on these developments yet earlier changes in Egyptian society fundamentally facilitated their actions and policies. This volume includes revisionist discussion of domestic political issues and foreign policy, the military, education, social reform, and class, as well as popular media, art, and literature. By introducing new approaches to these underappreciated categories of analysis through exploration of untapped sources and by re-examining the political context of the time, *Re Envisioning Egypt 1919-1952* proposes innovative methodologies for understanding this crucial period in Egyptian history, casting these years as fundamental to the country's twentieth century trajectory. **Handbook of Modern Egyptian History** Beth Baron, Jeffrey Culang, 2024. Until relatively recently, scholars of Egyptian history understood the modern period to begin with the movement of European people and ideas to Egypt's northern shores precipitated by Napoleon's invasion in 1798. From this perspective, modern Egyptian history was animated by the diverse and sometimes contradictory ways in which Egyptians responded over time to colonial power and modern forms of knowledge. This handbook, featuring 26 originally commissioned essays by top scholars in the field, adds to a growing literature that complicates the facile colonizer/colonized and modern/tradition binaries undergirding this view. Modern Egyptian history is a continuous process of translation and adaptation, invention and reinvention. Bringing together a dynamic and accomplished group of historians, the book maps the present state of modern Egyptian history, highlighting the most promising avenues of research and laying new ground upon which future generations of scholars may build. The contributors address both long-persisting themes in the field, though in new ways, as well as new themes, reshaping how we understand modern Egyptian history and thus Middle Eastern and global history. These include environment, family, infrastructure, intellectuals, labor, law, literature, medicine, politics, popular culture, and slavery. Within these categories, they explore issues of gender, race, and class. The questions these scholars consider reflect pressing contemporary concerns and debates, including medical sovereignty and bodily autonomy, the management of the environment, the rights and movements of workers, courts, and legal

Understanding the Public Sector in Egyptian Cinema: A State Venture Tamara Chahine Maatouk, 2019-11-04 In 1957 the public sector in Egyptian cinema was established followed shortly by the emergence of public sector film production in 1960 only to end eleven years later in 1971 Assailed with negativity since its demise if not earlier this state adventure in film production was dismissed as a complete failure financially administratively and most importantly artistically Although some scholars have sporadically commented on the role played by this sector it has not been the object of serious academic research aimed at providing a balanced nuanced general assessment of its overall impact This issue of Cairo Papers hopes to address this gap in the literature on Egyptian cinema After discussion of the role played by the public sector in trying to alleviate the financial crisis that threatened the film industry this study investigates whether there was a real change in the general perception of the cinema and the government's attitude toward it following the June 1967 Arab Israeli war
