Hoffmeier, 2005-10-06 In his pathbreaking Israel in Egypt James K Hoffmeier sought to refute the claims of scholars who doubt the historical accuracy of the biblical account of the Israelite sojourn in Egypt Analyzing a wealth of textual archaeological and geographical evidence he put forth a thorough defense of the biblical tradition Hoffmeier now turns his attention to the Wilderness narratives of Exodus Leviticus and Numbers As director of the North Sinai Archaeological Project Hoffmeier has led several excavations that have uncovered important new evidence supporting the Wilderness narratives including a major New Kingdom fort at Tell el Borg that was occupied during the Israelite exodus Hoffmeier employs these archaeological findings to shed new light on the route of the exodus from Egypt He also investigates the location of Mount Sinai and offers a rebuttal to those who have sought to locate it in northern Arabia and not in the Sinai peninsula as traditionally thought Hoffmeier addresses how and when the Israelites could have lived in Sinai as well as whether it would have been possible for Moses to write down the law received at Mount Sinai Building on the new evidence for the Israelite sojourn in Egypt Hoffmeier explores the Egyptian influence on
