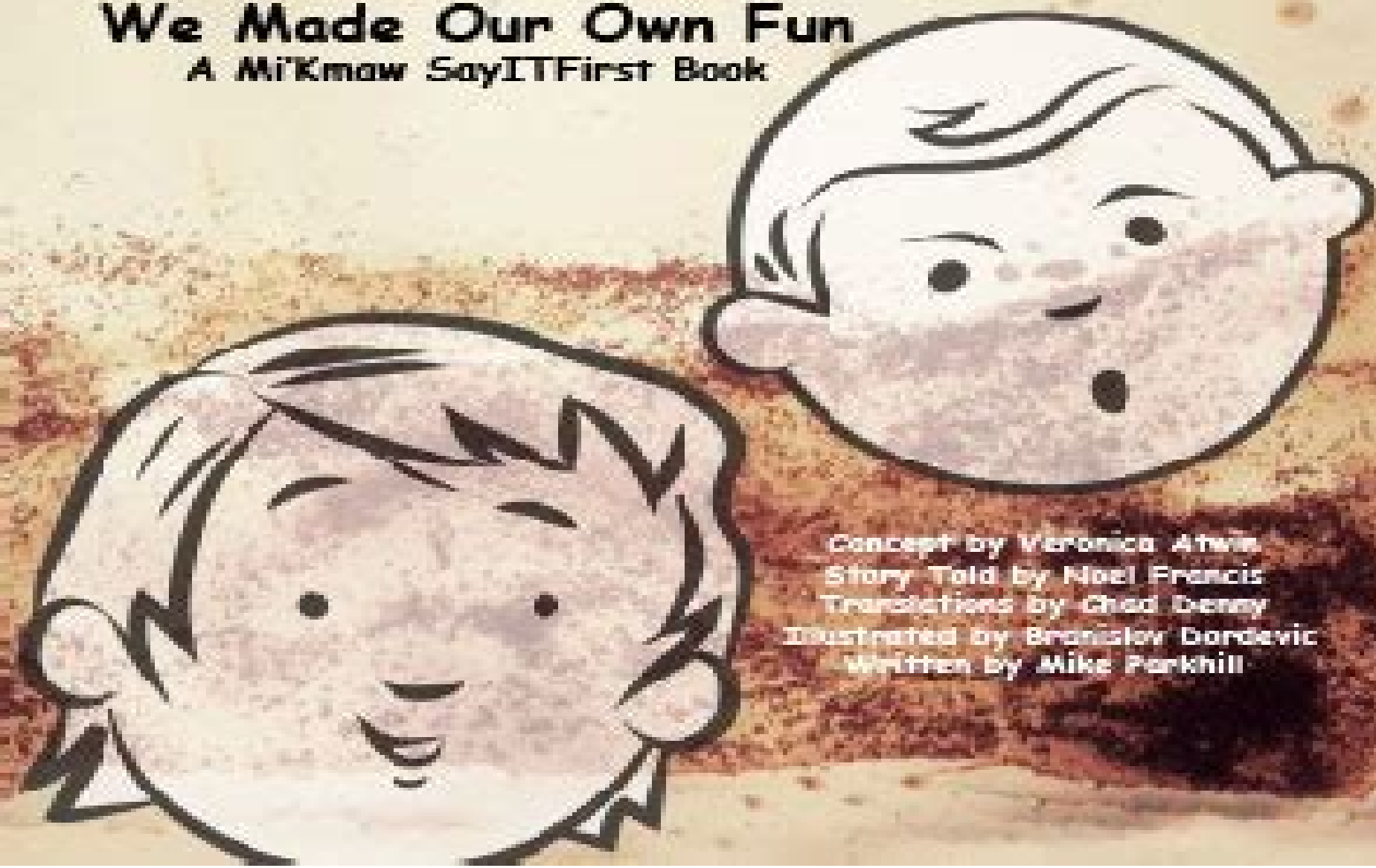

Freedom to Play Norah L. Lewis, 2010-09-29 When we were children we made our own fun is a frequent comment from those who were children in pre television times But what games activities and amusements did children enjoy prior to the mid 1950s Recollections of older Canadians selections from writings by Canadian authors and letters written to the children s pages of agricultural publications indicate that for most children play was then as now an essential part of childhood Through play youngsters developed the physical mental and emotional skills that helped them cope with life and taught them to get along with other children In both rural and urban settings children were generally free to explore their environment They were sent outdoors to play by both parents and teachers Their games were generally self organized and physically active with domestic animals acting as important companions and playmates Children frequently made their own toys and equipment and since playing rather than winning was important most children were included in games Special days holidays and organizations for children and youth provided welcome breaks from daily routines Their lives were busy but there was always time for play always time for fun Norah Lewis has provided an entertaining view of the toys games and activities in Canada and pre confederate Newfoundland from approximately 1900 through 1955 Her book will be of interest to historians educators and sociologists as well as anyone who lived through or wants to know more about those early years in Canada and the games children used to play With Children and Youth Kiaras Gharabaghi, Hans A. parts of the country they dedicated themselves to finding ways to survive the hottest periods of the Cold War What united these women was their shared concern for children s survival amid Cold War fears and dangers Acting on their identities as Canadian citizens and mothers they characterized with their activism the genuine interest many women had in protecting children s health and safety In addition their activities offered them a legitimate space to operate in the traditionally male realms of defence and diplomacy Their efforts had a direct impact on the lives of children in Canada and abroad and influenced changes in Canada s education curriculum immigration laws welfare practices defence policy and international relations Cold War Comforts offers insight into how women employed maternalism nationalism and internationalism in their work and examines shifting constructions of family and gender in Cold War Canada It will appeal to scholars of history child and family studies and social policy

County Roads Terry Culbert, 1995 Discharge Ron Belpedio, 2001-04-10 Discharge is the comic story of four gay sailors being released from the Navy in 1995 While stationed in Western Australia Hospital Corpsman Mickey Matlin the married father of two young children is discovered in an intimate situation with 19 year old Seaman Apprentice Eddie Vasquez Journalist Jon Gates is dumped by the base dentist at the same time and in a somewhat dramatic fashion he informs the Legal Officer he is gay and requests a release from the Navy ASAP No hard feelings He simply wants to be free of the military in the same way Elizabeth Taylor wanted to be rid of Eddie Fisher after she met Richard Burton Arrangements are made for the sailors to journey to Treasure Island off the coast of San Francisco In Perth they meet up with Machinists Mate Lawrence Watts who is also en route to the states for a medical discharge Their travels take them through New Zealand Sidney and Honolulu They consider the trip a last fling of sorts that is until they reach Treasure Island where they are tossed into a daytime jail disciplinary barracks which allows them evening liberty in San Francisco There is screaming and some sex as each man struggles to construct a new life outside of the military Young Vasquez deals with coming out issues Watts learns to accept his HIV status and Mickey Matlin must confront his wife who joins them in San Francisco from their rural Illinois

home Their stories are related through letters journal entries and other fairy tales that document their military discharges
