The controversies into which Hacker enters include the Diamond Conant interpretation of the *Tractatus* which is shown to be inconsistent with the text of the *Tractatus* and with Wittgenstein's explanations of and comments on his book; Winch's interpretation of the *Tractatus* conception of names; Kripke's interpretation of Wittgenstein's discussion of following a rule which is demonstrated to be remote from Wittgenstein's intentions; and Malcolm's defence of the idea that Wittgenstein claimed that mastery of a language logically requires that the language be shared with other speakers. These far ranging essays, several of them previously unpublished or difficult to find, shed much light upon different aspects of Wittgenstein's thought and upon the controversies which it has stimulated.

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
