Gerhard Richter October 18, 1977 : [published on the occasion of Gerhard Richter: October 18, 1977 at] **The Museum of Modern Art, New York [November 5, 2000 - January 30, 2001 ...]** Robert Storr, 2000 Gerhard Richter b 1932 is one of the most highly regarded of contemporary artists and his series of 15 paintings known as October 18 1977 is one of the 20th century's most famous works on a political theme It commemorates the day on which three young German radicals members of the militant Baader Meinhof group were found dead in a Stuttgart prison they were pronounced suicides but many people suspected that they had been murdered Richter's paintings created 11 years after this traumatic event are among the most challenging works of the artist's career These hauntingly powerful images derived from newspaper and police photography are now in the collection of the Museum of Modern Art New York and will be on view beginning in September 2000 as part of the MoMA2000 series of exhibitions In this book Robert Storr provides necessary political background to the series but his approach is art historical offering insight into the complexities of history painting in the modern era

Gerhard Richter Robert Storr, Gerhard Richter, 2002 Tour of the exhibition the Museum of Modern Art New York Feb 14 May 21 2002 and others *Gerhard Richter, Individualism, and Belonging in West Germany* Luke Smythe, 2022-07-29 This book reevaluates the art of Gerhard Richter b 1932 in relation to his efforts to achieve belonging in the face of West Germany's increasing individualism between the 1960s and the 1990s Richter fled East Germany in 1961 to escape the constraints of socialist collectivism His varied and extensive output in the West attests to his greater freedom under capitalism but also to his struggles with belonging in a highly individualised society a problem he was far from alone in facing The dynamic of increasing individualism has been closely examined by sociologists but has yet to be employed as a framework for understanding broader trends in recent German art history Rather than critique this development from a socialist perspective or experiment with new communal structures like a number of his colleagues Richter sought and found security in traditional modes of bourgeois collectivity like the family religion painting and the democratic capitalist state The book will be of interest to scholars working in art history as well as German history culture and politics

Gerhard Richter Gerhard Richter, 2009 Gerhard Richter born in Dresden in 1932 is one of the foremost painters of his generation A great deal has been written about the remarkable heterogeneity of Richter's work his seemingly wilful and defiant movement between abstract and figurative modes of representation and his use of a variety of methods of applying

paint to canvas Central to his work is a strong set of values which throughout his career he has expressed in extensive notes and writings and in provocative and memorable public declarations in which he shows himself to be the master of the paradoxical statement This volume makes available a comprehensive selection of Richter's texts several published for the first time These texts come from all periods of his career letters and interviews public statements about specific exhibitions private reflections drawn from personal correspondence answers to questions posed by critics and excerpts from journals discussing the intentions subjects methods and sources of his work from various periods Complete with a comprehensive appendix and accompanied by over a hundred photographs of artworks works in progress exhibition installations colleagues and family this book forms a brilliantly illuminating commentary on Richter's art as well as providing a thought provoking discussion on the status of art and the artist in society today

After the Red Army Faction Charity Scribner, 2014-12-16 Masterminded by women the Red Army Faction RAF terrorized West Germany from the 1970s to the 1990s Afterimages of its leaders persist in the works of pivotal artists and writers including Gerhard Richter Elfriede Jelinek and Slavoj Žižek Why were women so prominent in the RAF What does the continuing cultural response to the German armed struggle tell us about the representation of violence power and gender today Engaging critical theory Charity Scribner addresses these questions and analyzes signal works that point beyond militancy and terrorism This literature and art discloses the failures of the Far Left and registers the radical potential that RAF women actually forfeited After the Red Army Faction maps out a cultural history of militancy and introduces postmilitancy as a new critical term As Scribner demonstrates the most compelling examples of postmilitant culture don't just repudiate militancy these works investigate its horizons of possibility particularly on the front of sexual politics Objects of analysis include as yet untranslated essays by Theodor Adorno and Jürgen Habermas as well as novels by Friedrich Dürrenmatt and Judith Kuckart Johann Kresnik's Tanztheaterstück Ulrike Meinhof and the blockbuster exhibition Regarding Terror at the Berlin Kunst Werke Scribner focuses on German cinema offering incisive interpretations of films by Margarethe von Trotta Volker Schlöndorff and Fatih Akin as well as the international box office success The Baader Meinhof Complex These readings disclose dynamic junctures among several fields of inquiry national and sexual identity the disciplining of the militant body and the relationship between mass media and the arts

A Hunger for Aesthetics Michael Kelly, 2012-05-15 For decades aesthetics has been subjected to a variety of critiques often concerning its treatment of beauty or the autonomy of art Collectively these complaints have generated an anti aesthetic stance prevalent in the contemporary art world Yet if we examine the motivations for these critiques Michael Kelly argues we find theorists and artists hungering for a new kind of aesthetics one better calibrated to contemporary art and its moral and political demands Following an analysis of the work of Stanley Cavell Arthur Danto Umberto Eco Susan Sontag and other philosophers of the 1960s who made aesthetics more responsive to contemporary art Kelly considers Sontag's aesthetics in greater detail In On Photography 1977 she argues that a photograph of a person who is suffering only aestheticizes the suffering for the viewer's

pleasure yet she insists in *Regarding the Pain of Others* 2003 that such a photograph can have a sustainable moral political effect precisely because of its aesthetics Kelly considers this dramatic change to be symptomatic of a cultural shift in our understanding of aesthetics ethics and politics He discusses these issues in connection with Gerhard Richter's and Doris Salcedo's art chosen because it is often identified with the anti aesthetic even though it is clearly aesthetic Focusing first on Richter's Baader Meinhof series Kelly concludes with Salcedo's enactments of suffering caused by social injustice Throughout *A Hunger for Aesthetics* he reveals the place of critique in contemporary art which if we understand aesthetics as critique confirms that it is integral to art Meeting the demand for aesthetics voiced by many who participate in art Kelly advocates for a critical aesthetics that confirms the power of art *Bulletin of the City Art Museum of St. Louis* St. Louis Art Museum, 1991

Uncertain Histories Kate Palmer Albers, 2015-07-21 The compulsion to dwell on history on how it is recorded stored saved forgotten narrated lost remembered and made public has been at the heart of artists engagement with the photographic medium since the late 1960s Uncertain Histories considers some of that work ranging from installations that incorporate vast numbers of personal and vernacular photographs by Christian Boltanski Dinh Q L and Gerhard Richter to confrontations with absence in the work of Joel Sternfeld and Ken Gonzales Day Projects such as these revolve around a photographic paradox that hinges equally on knowing and not knowing on definitive proof coupled with uncertainty on abundance of imagery being met squarely with its own inadequacy Photography is seen as a fundamentally ambiguous medium that can be evocative of the historical past while at the same time limited in the stories it can convey Rather than proclaiming definitively what photography is the work discussed here posits photographs as objects always held in suspension perpetually oscillating in their ability to tell history Yet this ultimately leads to a new kind of knowledge production uncertainty is not a dead end but a generative space for the viewer's engagement with the
