Gerhard Richter Gerhard Richter, 2012 In 1988 Gerhard Richter created one of the most controversial and fascinating political painting cycles of all time with his Baader Meinhof series In 2002 he returned to the theme of media and political truth with his artist's book War Cut For this project Richter photographed 216 details of his abstract painting No 648 2_1987 and working on a long table over a period of several weeks combined these 4 x 6 inch details with 165 texts on the Iraq war published in the German Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung newspaper on the dates of the war's outbreak 20 and 21 March 2003 My method was to attach a number of texts to a number of images without having to think about whether something would be better positioned to the left or the right above or below _ Richter told an interviewer for a New York Times feature on the publication I placed these images so that a connection develops in terms of colours structures and other characteristics Some images match the cruelty and the madness described in the texts shockingly well And others can even serve as illustrations when the texts speak of deserts and other landscapes _ Originally published only in German in 2004 this long awaited English version of this important artist's book presents Richter's powerful attempt to accommodate the extremity of war For this edition Richter applied the same process of text selection to The New York Times using the same dates of the war's outbreak

Gerhard Richter Gerhard Richter, 1996 Theory of Form Florian Klinger, 2022-06-24 A pragmatist conception of artistic form through a study of the painter Gerhard Richter In this study of the practice of contemporary painter Gerhard Richter Florian Klinger proposes a fundamental change in the way we think about art today In reaction to the exhaustion of the modernist postmodernist paradigm's negotiation of the essence of art he takes Richter to pursue a pragmatist model that understands artistic form as action Here form is no longer conceived according to what it says as a vehicle of expression representation or realization of something other than itself but strictly according to what it does Through its doing Klinger argues artistic form is not only more real but also more shared than non artistic reality and thus enables interaction under conditions where it would otherwise not be possible It is a human practice aimed at testing and transforming the limits of shared reality urgently needed in situations where such reality breaks down or turns precarious Drawing on pragmatist thought philosophical aesthetics and art history Klinger's account of Richter's practice offers a highly distinctive conceptual alternative for contemporary art in general

This book a collection of Alex Danchev's essays on the theme of art war and terror offers a sustained demonstration of the way in which works of art can help us to explore the most difficult ethical and political issues of our time war terror extermination torture and abuse It takes seriously the idea of the artist as moral witness to this realm considering war photography for example as a form of humanitarian intervention War poetry war films and war diaries are also considered in a broad view of art and of war Kafka is drawn upon to address torture and abuse in the war on terror Homer is utilised to analyse current talk of barbarisation The paintings of Gerhard Richter are used to investigate the terrorists of the Baader Meinhof group while the photographs of Don McCullin and the writings of Vassily Grossman and Primo Levi allow the author to propose an ethics of small acts of altruism This book examines the nature of war over the last century from the Great War to a particular focus on the current Global War on Terror It investigates what it means to be human in war the cost it exacts and the ways of coping Several of the essays therefore have a biographical focus **A Hunger for Aesthetics** Michael Kelly, 2012-05-15

For decades aesthetics has been subjected to a variety of critiques often concerning its treatment of beauty or the autonomy of art Collectively these complaints have generated an anti aesthetic stance prevalent in the contemporary art world Yet if we examine the motivations for these critiques Michael Kelly argues we find theorists and artists hungering for a new kind of aesthetics one better calibrated to contemporary art and its moral and political demands Following an analysis of the work of Stanley Cavell Arthur Danto Umberto Eco Susan Sontag and other philosophers of the 1960s who made aesthetics more responsive to contemporary art Kelly considers Sontag's aesthetics in greater detail In *On Photography* 1977 she argues that a photograph of a person who is suffering only aestheticizes the suffering for the viewer's pleasure yet she insists in *Regarding the Pain of Others* 2003 that such a photograph can have a sustainable moral political effect precisely because of its aesthetics Kelly considers this dramatic change to be symptomatic of a cultural shift in our understanding of aesthetics ethics and politics He discusses these issues in connection with Gerhard Richter's and Doris Salcedo's art chosen because it is often identified with the anti aesthetic even though it is clearly aesthetic Focusing first on Richter's Baader Meinhof series Kelly concludes with Salcedo's enactments of suffering caused by social injustice Throughout *A Hunger for Aesthetics* he reveals the place of critique in contemporary art which if we understand aesthetics as critique confirms that it is integral to art Meeting the demand for aesthetics voiced by many who participate in art Kelly advocates for a critical aesthetics that confirms the power of art **Poetic Thinking Today** Amir Eshel, 2019-11-05

human insight and wisdom its capacity to help protect and cultivate human freedom All the contemporary works of art and literature that Poetic Thinking Today examines touch on our recent experiences with tyranny in culture and politics They express the uninhibited thoughts and ideas of their creators even as they foster poetic thinking in us In an era characterized by the global reemergence of authoritarian tendencies Amir Eshel writes with the future of the humanities in mind He urges the acknowledgment and cultivation of poetic thinking as a crucial component of our intellectual pursuits in general and of our educational systems more specifically Gerhard Richter Gerhard Richter, Haus der Kunst München, Museum Ludwig, 2008 Talking to art historian Benjamin Buchloh in 1988 Gerhard Richter cited the appearances of Jackson Pollock and Lucio Fontana at the second Documenta in Kassel in the late 50s as decisive encounters for his then incipient art Just a few years later Richter would style himself as a German Pop artist but in the 80s he returned to pure abstraction for its possibilities of bitter truth liberation and a completely different and new content expressing itself His abstract paintings present a heavily worked surface blurred and scraped to both veil and expose prior layers In other words they manage a tension between depth layer and strong horizontal activity blur Unlike much heavily worked abstraction and in spite of their scale their total effect is not heroic Richter's almost deadpan process oriented transparency cancels out such chest beating but the artist that responded to the direct energies of Pollock's work has clearly found a way some decades later to conjure both zest and detachment simultaneously Abstraction has made up a dominant portion of Richter's output since the 80s inaugurating a fruitful dialectic with figuration and Large Abstracts collects works produced between 1986 and 2006 For this volume Buchloh once described by former Museum of Modern Art New York curator and current Dean of the Yale School of Art Robert Storr as the artist's longtime sparring partner returns to the fray and along with Beate Stntgen and Gregor Stemmrch offers critical insight on this iconic oeuvre Cultivating Picturacy James A.
