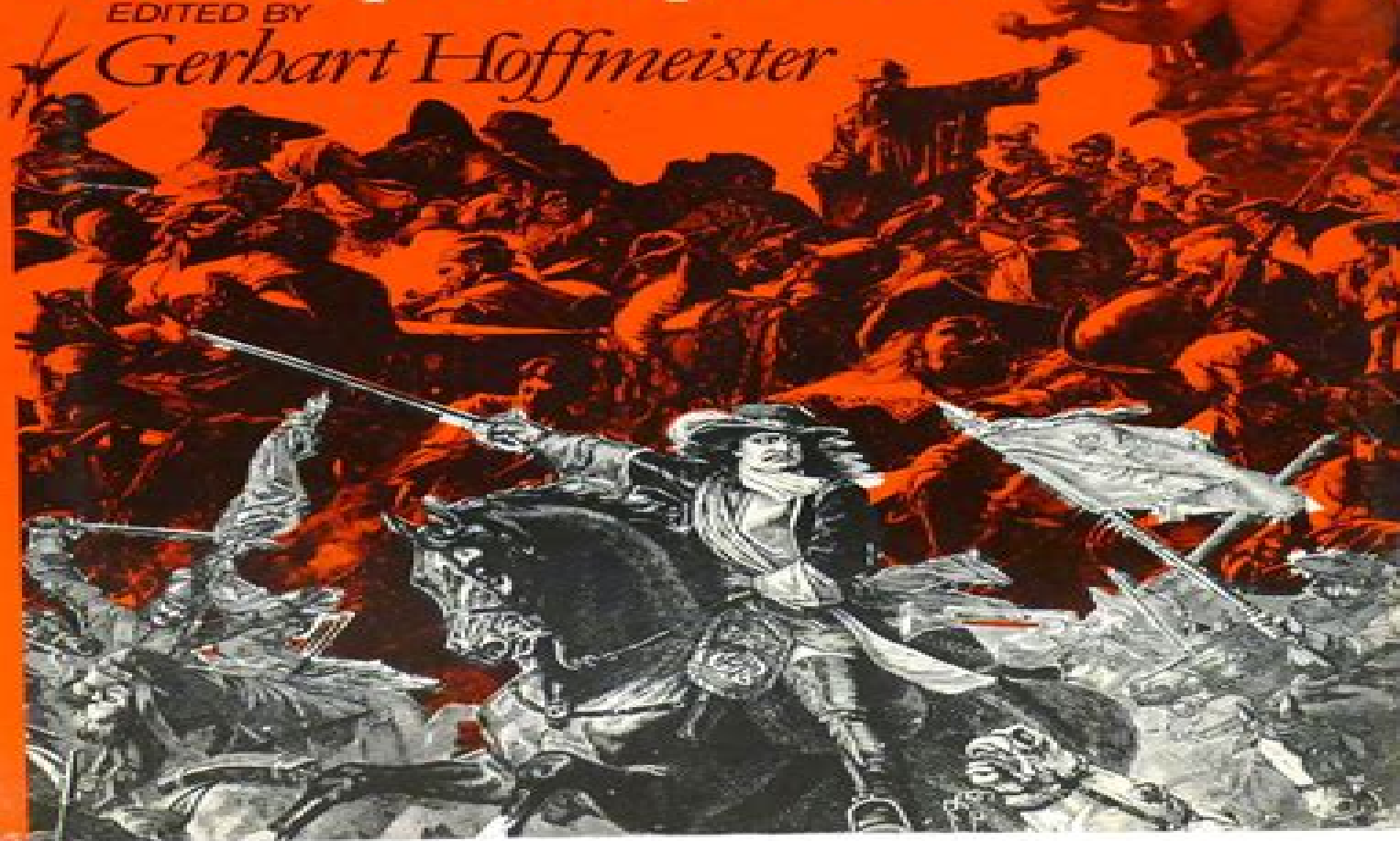

German Baroque Literature Gerhart Hoffmeister, 1983 **Günter Grass's Use of Baroque Literature** Alexander Weber, 1995 This is the first study to discuss the affinity between Grass's complete works and baroque literature Grass's employment of baroque literature is of particular interest because it takes up a tradition from which German literature has long broken away Alexander Weber's argument moves from an outline of general thematic parallels in the early works to an analysis of the conscious use of baroque literature in *Der Butt* and *Das Treffen in Telgte* He offers both a close reading of Grass and general reflections on how a past literary tradition can be adopted by a modern writer The study focuses on the themes of vanity *carpe diem* and Senecan Stoicism in the early works it discusses parallels between the rhetorical structure of the courtly historical novel and *Der Butt* and traces the artist's melancholy and baroque allegories in *Der Butt* and *Das Treffen in Telgte* *The Early Baroque Era* Curtis Price, 1993-11-09 **German Secular Song-books of the**

Harper, 2024-11-01 This title was first published in 2003 The secular song of the 17th century represents a relatively neglected area of German culture In this book Anthony J Harper first studies the songs of the two great models of the time Martin Opitz and Paul Fleming following this with an analysis of the song books and collections from three regions the North East Central Germany and the North The procedure is thus both historical and geographical The texts of these songs are examined in relation to structural principles thematic range and stylistic treatment Harper establishes common features and regional variations of this genre which involves love poetry songs of manners with colourful portrayals of everyday life and comic songs in a lower stylistic register Particular attention is paid to the work of Albert and Dach in Königsberg Finckelthaus Schirmer Krieger and Schoch in Leipzig and Dresden and Rist Voigtlander Zesen Greflinger and Stieler in the Hamburg region Where appropriate the book assesses the role of musical settings while not seeking to offer technical insights into musical matters Of value to scholars of German literature this study should also be of interest to musicologists working on the Renaissance and Baroque periods **The Francis Daniel Pastorius Reader**

Patrick Erben, Alfred Brophy, Margo Lambert, 2020-02-26 Francis Daniel Pastorius was one of the first German settlers to Pennsylvania and a touchstone figure of German American cultural heritage This monumental anthology presents a selection of his many writings in one volume Pastorius sailed to North America as a Pietist but found a unique home among the Quakers in Pennsylvania Within this early modern religious context he was a lawyer educator and community leader a polymath and a prolific writer and collector of knowledge At the turn of the eighteenth century Pastorius held one of the largest manuscript collections in North America and wrote voluminously in multiple languages His collecting curation and dissemination represents a unique look at the ways information was stored processed and utilized during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries in both North America and Europe This rich selection of Pastorius's writings on religion education

Parente Jr.,2022-08-22 *Sacred Music as Public Image for Holy Roman Emperor Ferdinand III* Andrew H. Weaver,2016-04-08 Ferdinand III played a crucial role both in helping to end the Thirty Years War and in re establishing Habsburg sovereignty within his hereditary lands and yet he remains one of the most neglected of all Habsburg emperors The underlying premise of Sacred Music as Public Image for Holy Roman Emperor Ferdinand III is that Ferdinand s accomplishments came not through

diplomacy or strong leadership but primarily through a skillful manipulation of the arts through which he communicated important messages to his subjects and secured their allegiance to the Catholic Church. An important locus for cultural activity at court especially as related to the Habsburgs political power was the Emperor's public image. Ferdinand III offers a fascinating case study in monarchical representation for the war necessitated that he revise the image he had cultivated at the beginning of his reign that of a powerful victorious warrior. Weaver argues that by focusing on the patronage of sacred music rather than the more traditional visual and theatrical means of representation Ferdinand III was able to uphold his reputation as a pious Catholic reformer and subtly revise his triumphant martial image without sacrificing his power while also achieving his Counter Reformation goal of unifying his hereditary lands under the Catholic church. Drawing upon recent methodological approaches to the representation of other early modern monarchs as well as upon the theory of confessionalization this book places the sacred vocal music composed by imperial musicians into the rich cultural political and religious contexts of mid seventeenth century Central Europe. The book incorporates dramatic productions such as opera oratorio and Jesuit drama as well as works in other media but the primary focus is the more numerous and more frequently performed Latin texted paraliturgical genre of the motet which has generally not been considered by scholars as a vehicle for monarchical representation. By examining the representation of this little studied emperor during a crucial time in European history this book opens a window into the unique world view of the Habsburgs allowing for a previously untold narrative of the end of the Thirty Years War as seen through the eyes of this important ruling family.

Translation and Translation Theory in Seventeenth-century Germany James N. Hardin, 1992 **New German Studies**, 1984 Transformations of the German Novel Monique Rinere, 2009

At the beginning of the eighteenth century the German literary establishment considered the novel the contemptible entertainment of the uneducated. By the end of the century the novel had eclipsed the epic poem as the most appropriate genre for depicting humankind and its preoccupations. The story of the novel's emergence as a respected and productive artistic genre is intimately bound up with the vicissitudes of the most popular of all German baroque works Hans Jacob Christoffel von Grimmelshausen's 1621-22/1676 *Der abentheurliche Simplicissimus Teutsch* 1668/69. Between 1756 and 1785 *Simplicissimus* quietly found its way into bookshops three times in radically different forms in adaptations that were not as critics have asserted arbitrary but quite purposeful. This investigation discusses the ways in which this canonical text was reworked to reflect the thinking of leading and warring Enlightenment aestheticians. At the genre war's end the novel emerged triumphant and *Simplicissimus* adaptations had been instrumental in securing the victory. The multi-faceted *Simplicissimus* had served as a vehicle for reifying theoretical positions in the conflicts. For as the social and aesthetic climate shifted radically Grimmelshausen's work not only survived but took on new life in the most important literary campaign of the century.

Jeremias Drexel's 'Christian Zodiac' Nicholas J. Crowe, 2016-05-06. First published in 1622 Jeremias Drexel's *Zodiacus christianus* or *Christian Zodiac* was a remarkable work of religious iconography and

spiritual self help Raised a Lutheran but converting to Catholicism in his youth Drexel 1581 1638 was well placed to publish a book that appealed to Protestants as well as Catholics his Zodiac appearing in multiple reprints re editions and translations across Europe during his lifetime and posthumously across the rest of the seventeenth century in an astonishing arc of popularity The orbit of his readers catchment was geographically and denominationally wide to a conspicuous degree Drexel was among the most read authors of that century a genuine luminary in the culture of the German Baroque and arguably the most published writer of the period Offering the first modern translation into English since the early seventeenth century this critical edition re acquaints Anglophone audiences with a sample of the spiritual and philosophical writings of a figure whose significant publication record made him a bestseller during his lifetime and for many decades afterwards As well as addressing issues of spiritual iconography with relation to signs of predestination the book also has much to say about authorship publishing and the dissemination of ideas Including a scholarly introduction full footnotes and an up to date bibliography this new edition does much to help reveal these themes within the complex interconnections between religion mysticism iconography and scholarship in early modern Europe **Aberrations of Mourning** Laurence A.
