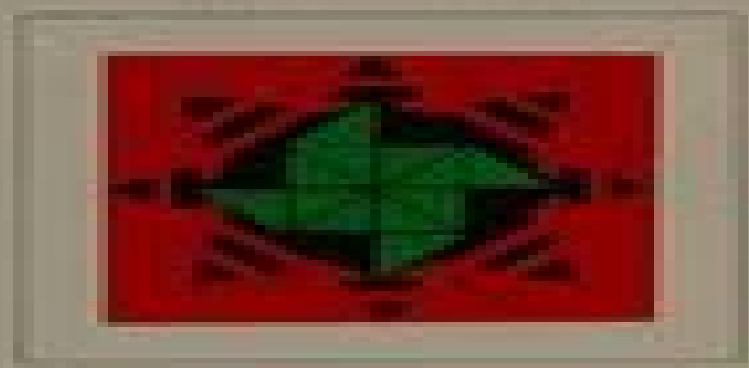

Despite the educational and professional advances made by minorities in recent decades African Americans remain woefully underrepresented in the fields of science technology mathematics and engineering Even at its peak in 2000 African American representation in engineering careers reached only 5.7 percent while blacks made up 15 percent of the U.S. population Some forty five years after the Civil Rights Act sought to eliminate racial differences in education and employment what do we make of an occupational pattern that perpetually follows the lines of race Race Rigor and Selectivity in U.S. Engineering pursues this question and its ramifications through historical case studies Focusing on engineering programs in three settings in Maryland Illinois and Texas from the 1940s through the 1990s Amy E.
