

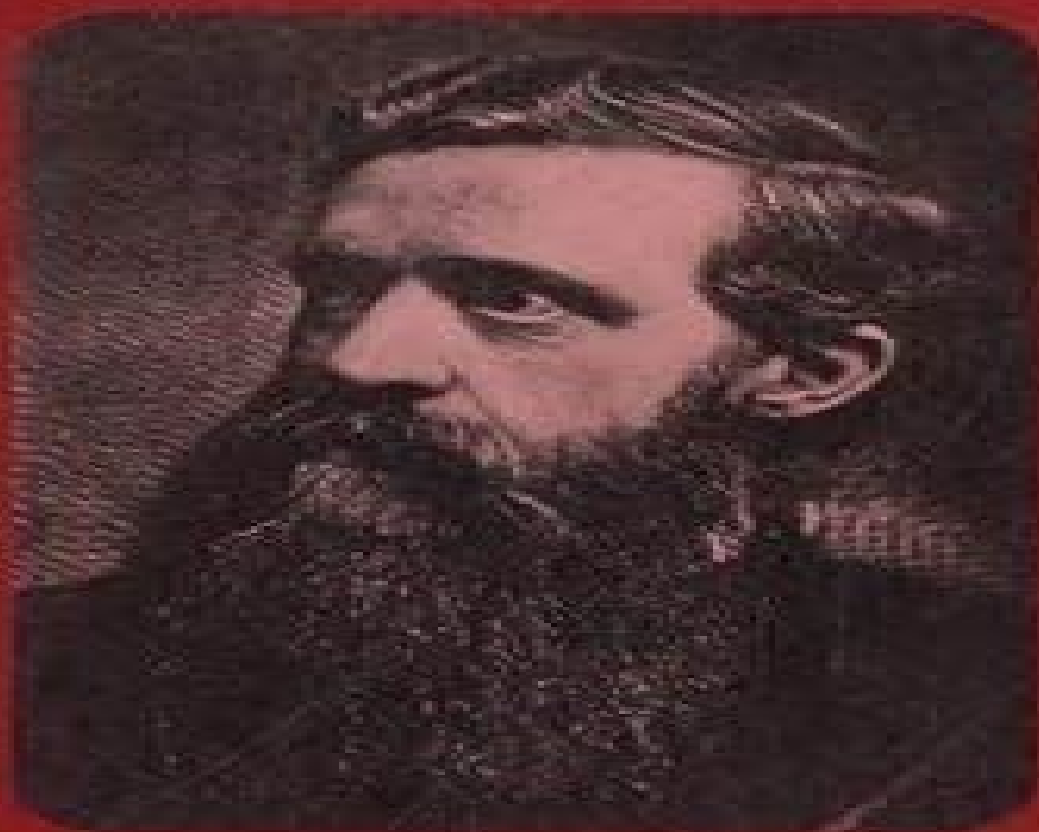

Just think, she killed all them animals, echoed another. There that's her. All during the hot Philadelphia summer of 1876, throngs of people pushed and shoved their way into the Kansas Colorado Building, eager to catch a glimpse of the small, dark-haired woman responsible for creating the extraordinary display of bears, deer and other mammals cavorting over a Rocky Mountain landscape. Curious, skeptical, friendly, on and on they came until the policemen stationed at the doors were hard-pressed to maintain control. The fairgoers were intent on seeing for themselves the modern Diana who had come all the way from the wilds of Colorado. Maxine Benson's finely crafted biography of Martha Maxwell illuminates the little-known but important career of a remarkable woman. Naturalist, taxidermist, museologist, artist, Maxwell pioneered in a number of fields new for women. Born in Pennsylvania in 1831 and educated in the Midwest, she traveled to the gold fields of Colorado with her husband in 1860. A chance encounter with a German taxidermist determined her lifework, and Maxwell soon devoted her boundless energy to hunting and mounting all forms of Rocky Mountain wildlife, which she displayed in unusual habitat settings in her museum in Boulder and later in Denver. Her spreading fame led to an invitation to exhibit her collection at the

Philadelphia Centennial Exposition where she achieved international renown As Maxwell s major scientific and artistic contributions to natural history taxidermy and display were recognized her influence carried to the Smithsonian Institution Separated from her husband and alienated from her daughter however she became increasingly unhappy as her professional accomplishments grew Her tragic and lonely death in 1881 revealed something of the price she paid for daring to be different Like that of other accomplished women of her era Maxwell s fame did not keep pace with the significant influence she had on her profession Thanks to Maxine Benson Martha Maxwell now takes her rightful place in the history of the West and of the nation

**The History of Ornithology in Virginia** David W. Johnston,2003 Host to a large and diverse bird population as well as a long human history Virginia is arguably the birthplace of ornithology in North America David W Johnston s History of Ornithology in Virginia the result of over a decade of research is the first book to address this fascinating element of the state s natural history Tertiary era fossils show that birds inhabited Virginia as early as 65 million years ago Their first human observers were the region s many Indian tribes and later colonists on Roanoke Island and in Jamestown Explorers pushing westward contributed further to the development of a conception of birds that was distinctively American By the 1900s planter farmers naturalists and government employees had amassed bird records from the Barrier Islands and the Dismal Swamp to the Blue Ridge and Appalachian Mountains The modern era saw

the emergence of ornithological organizations and game laws as well as increasingly advanced studies of bird distribution migration pathways and breeding biology Johnston shows us how ornithology in Virginia evolved from observations of wondrous creatures to a sophisticated science recognizing some 435 avian species David W Johnston taught ornithology at the University of Virginia's Mountain Lake Biological Station for nearly two decades and has edited numerous ecological studies as well as the Journal of Field Ornithology and Ornithological Monographs

The Abyssinian Art of Louis Agassiz Fuertes in the Field Museum Paul Johnsgard, 2020 This book documents the paintings and drawings executed by Louis Agassiz Fuertes during the Field Museum of Natural History's seven month expedition to Ethiopia Abyssinia in 1926-27 During that time Fuertes completed 70 field watercolors that illustrate 55 species of birds and four species of mammals He also executed 34 pencil drawings which illustrate 13 species of mammals and 11 species of birds plus numerous miscellaneous sketches and small watercolors This book identifies and describes the biology of all 69 species of birds and mammals illustrated by Fuertes and includes 32 color reproductions of Fuertes's watercolors that were published as a limited edition album in 1930 by the Field Museum The 60,000 word text provides brief summaries of all these species ecology behavior and reproductive biology as well as information about their current populations and conservation status A review of Fuertes's life his influence on modern bird and wildlife art and his participation in and artistic contributions to the Field Museum's Abyssinian Expedition is also included as well as more than 250 bibliographic citations

**A Passion for Birds** Mark Barrow, 2000-02-27 In the decades following the Civil War as industrialization urbanization and economic expansion increasingly reshaped the landscape many Americans began seeking adventure and aesthetic gratification through avian pursuits By the turn of the century hundreds of thousands of middle and upper class devotees were rushing to join Audubon societies purchase field guides and keep records of the species they encountered in the wild Mark Barrow vividly reconstructs this story not only through the experiences of birdwatchers collectors conservationists and taxidermists but also through those of a relatively new breed of bird enthusiast the technically oriented ornithologist In exploring how ornithologists struggled to forge a discipline and profession amidst an explosion of popular interest in natural history A Passion for Birds provides the first book length history of American ornithology from the death of John James Audubon to the Second World War Barrow shows how efforts to form a scientific community distinct from popular birders met with only partial success The founding of the American Ornithologists Union in 1883 and the subsequent expansion of formal educational and employment opportunities in ornithology marked important milestones in this campaign Yet by the middle of the twentieth century when ornithology had finally achieved the status of a modern profession its practitioners remained dependent on the services of birdwatchers and other amateur enthusiasts Environmental issues also loom large in Barrow's account as he traces areas of both cooperation and conflict between ornithologists and wildlife conservationists Recounting a colorful story based on the interactions among a wide variety of bird lovers this book will interest historians of science

environmental historians ornithologists birdwatchers and anyone curious about the historical roots of today's birding boom

**Arc of the Medicine Line** Tony Rees, 2007-01-01 Today the borderland between Canada and the United States is a wide empty sweep of wheat fields and pasture measured by a grid of gravel roads that sees little traffic and few people who do not make their lives there It has been much this way for more than a century now but there was a moment when the great silence shrouding this place was broken and that moment changed it forever Arc of the Medicine Line is a compelling narrative of that moment the completion of the official border between the United States and Canada in 1874 In late July of 1874 the Sweetgrass Hills sheltered the greatest accumulation of scientists teamsters scouts cooks and soldiers to be seen in this part of the world before the coming of the railways The men of the boundary commissions American British and Canadian established an astronomical station and the last of their supply depots as they

prepared to draw the Medicine Line across the final hundred of the nearly nine hundred miles between Manitoba's Lake of the Woods and the Continental Divide. In the brief weeks the surveyors and soldiers spent in Milk River country they witnessed and played a singular part in the beginning of the end for the open West. That hot dry summer of 1874 marked the outside world's final assault on this last frontier.

**A Life Cut Short at the Little Big Horn** Todd E. Harburn, 2023-02-23

Of the three physicians at the Battle of the Little Big Horn, Doctor George Edwin Lord, 1846-76, was the lone commissioned medical officer, an assistant surgeon with the United States Army's 7th Cavalry, one more soldier caught up in the U.S. government's efforts to fulfill what many people believed was the young country's Manifest Destiny. *A Life Cut Short at the Little Big Horn* tells Lord's story for the first time. Notable for its unique angle on Custer's last stand and for its depiction of frontier-era medicine, the book is above all a compelling portrait of the making of an army medical professional in mid-nineteenth-century America. Drawing on newly discovered documents, Todd E. Harburn describes Lord's education and training at Bowdoin College in Maine and the Chicago Medical College, detailing what the study of medicine entailed at the time for a young man of promise held in universal esteem. Lord's time as a contract physician with the army took him in 1874 to the U.S. Northern Boundary Survey. From there, Harburn recounts how, after a failed romance and the rigors of the U.S. Army Medical Board examination, the young doctor proceeded to his first and only appointment as a post surgeon at Fort Buford in Dakota Territory. What followed, of course, was Lord's service and his death in the Little Big Horn campaign, which this book shows us for the first time from the unique perspective of the surgeon. A portrait of a singular figure in the milieu of the American military's nineteenth-century medical elite, *A Life Cut Short at the Little Big Horn* offers a close look at a familiar chapter in U.S. history and a reminder of the humanity lost in a battle that resonates to this day.
