Rose,2010-06-10 This is the story of a full life in an English community lived first and told afterwards from within      **The English Pig** Robert Malcolmson,Stephanos Mastoris,1998-01-01 The English Pig is an account of pigs and pig keeping from the sixteenth century to modern times concentrating on the domestic cottage pig rather than commercial farming In Victorian England the pig was an integral part of village life both visible and essential Living in close proximity to its owners fed on scraps and the subject of perennial interest the pig when dead provided the means to repay social and monetary debts as well as excellent meat While the words associated with the pig such as hoggish swine and pigsty and phrases like greedy as a pig associate the pig with greed and dirt this book shows the pig s virtues intelligence and distinctive character It is a portrait of one of the most recognisable but least known of farm animals seen here also in many photographs and other representations The pig has a modest place in literature from Fielding s pig keeping Parson Trulliber to Hardy s Jude the Obscure and to Flora Thompson s Lark Rise to Candleford In modern times while vanishing from the sight of most people it has been sentimentalised in children s stories and commercialised in advertisements      **Rural Women Workers in Nineteenth-century England** Nicola Verdon,2002 The range of women s work and its contribution to the family economy studied here for the first time Despite the growth of women s history and rural social history in the past thirty years the work performed by women who lived in the nineteenth century English countryside is still an under researched issue Verdon directly addresses this gap in the historiography placing the rural female labourer centre stage for the first time The involvement of women in the rural labour market as farm servants as day labourers in agriculture and as domestic workers are all examined using a wide range of printed and unpublished sources from across England The roles village women performed in the informal rural economy household labour gathering resources and exploiting systems of barter and exchange are also assessed Changes in women s economic opportunities are explored alongside the implications of region age marital status number of children in the family and local custom women s economic contribution to the rural labouring household is established as a critical part of family subsistence despite criticism of such work and the rise in male wages after 1850 NICOLA VERDON is a Research Fellow in the Rural History Centre University of Reading      **Good Neighbours. With Drawings by John Hookham** Walter ROSE (of Haddenham.),1942      *The Roots of Rural Capitalism* Christopher Clark,2019-06-30 Between the late colonial period and the Civil War the countryside of the American northeast was largely transformed Rural New England changed from a society of independent farmers relatively isolated from international markets into a capitalist economy closely linked to the national market an economy in which much farming and manufacturing output was produced by wage labor Using the Connecticut Valley as an example *The Roots of Rural Capitalism* demonstrates how this important change came about Christopher Clark joins the active debate on the transition

to capitalism with a fresh interpretation that integrates the insights of previous studies with the results of his detailed research. Largely rejecting the assumption of recent scholars that economic change can be explained principally in terms of markets, he constructs a broader social history of the rural economy and traces the complex interactions of social structure, household strategies, gender relations, and cultural values that propelled the countryside from one economic system to another. Above all, he shows that people of rural Massachusetts were not passive victims of changes forced upon them but actively created a new economic world as they tried to secure their livelihoods under changing demographic and economic circumstances. The emergence of rural capitalism, Clark maintains, was not the result of a single transition; rather, it was an accretion of new institutions and practices that occurred over two generations and in two broad chronological phases. It is his singular contribution to demonstrate the coexistence of a family-based household economy persisting well into the nineteenth century and the market-oriented system of production and exchange that is generally held to have emerged full-blown by the eighteenth century. He is adept at describing the clash of values sustaining both economies and the ways in which the rural household-based economy, through a process he calls involution, ultimately gave way to a new order. His analysis of the distinctive role of rural women in this transition constitutes a strong new element in the study of gender as a factor in the economic, social, and cultural shifts of the period. Sophisticated in argument and engaging in presentation, this book will be recognized as a major contribution to the history of capitalism and society in nineteenth-century America.

*Fraudulent Lives* Steven King, 2024-11-15. The Western welfare state model is beset with structural financial and moral crises. So-called scroungers, cheats, and disability fakers persistently occupy the centre of public policy discussions, even as official statistics suggest that relatively small amounts of money are lost to such schemes. In *Fraudulent Lives*, Steven King focuses on the British case in the first ever long-term analysis of the scale, meaning, and consequences of welfare fraud in Western nations. King argues that an expectation of dishonesty on the part of claimants was written into the basic fabric of the founding statutes of the British welfare state in 1601 and that nothing has subsequently changed. Efforts throughout history to detect and punish fraud have been superficial at best, because, he argues, it has never been in the interests of the three main stakeholders: claimants, the general public, and officials and policymakers to eliminate it. Tracing a substantial underbelly of fraud from the seventeenth century to today, King finds remarkable continuities and historical parallels in public attitudes towards the honesty of welfare recipients, patterns that hold true across Western welfare states.
