Moore, 2014-07-15 In Kentucky the first frontier beyond the Appalachians Arthur K Moore finds a unique ground for examining some of the basic elements in America's cultural development There the frontier mind acquired definite form and there emerged the forces that largely shaped the American West Moore reveals the Kentucky frontiersman as a colorful exciting figure about whom there gathered a golden haze of myth from which historians have never been able to free him He finds that noble savage did not possess those high qualities of mind and spirit which both his contemporaries and present day writers have attributed him He especially questions the wide and uncritical acceptance of Frederick Jackson Turner's theory that the illiterate emigrants had vast creative powers and made worthwhile contributions to government education religion and literature The author professor of English at the University of Kentucky has shown how unlikely it was that the uncouth frontiersmen subjected as they were to brutalizing influences and separated from the main stream of Western civilization could find in themselves the intellectual and spiritual resources to create a distinctive culture Far from displaying the benevolence and rationality imputed to men living close to nature the frontiersmen proved themselves addicted to demagogism narrow sectarianism materialism and anti intellectualism **The Frontier Mind** is an uncompromising book It may not win your assent but it will force you to reexamine the grounds of your beliefs about the settlement and development of the American West

An American Religious Movement Winfred Ernest Garrison, 2015-04-17 In an earlier volume I recited the history of the Disciples of Christ under the title *Religion Follows the Frontier* The phrase was designed to emphasize the fact that this religious movement was born under pioneer conditions on the American frontier in the days when the frontier was just crossing the Alleghenies that much of its formative thinking followed patterns congenial to the frontier mind and that its early expansion kept pace with the westward wave of migration Since that book is now out of print while interest in the theme is increasing it has seemed desirable to

rewrite the history If this were merely a sequel to the other I would call it Growing Up with the Country It remains true that the pioneer beginnings must be remembered and understood if the initial motives and methods of the Disciples and the processes of their growth are to be understood But important as the frontier is as a fact in the history of the United States and of every phase of culture in the Middle West an equally significant fact is that as the frontier rolled westward it left behind it a widening area in which pioneer conditions no longer prevailed As the country was growing by the expansive drive of which the frontier was the cutting edge it was also growing up both behind and on the frontier The process of maturing is as significant as that of expanding Since the present purpose is to survey the history of the Disciples through both of these phases I have resisted the allurements of this second title and am giving the book a name which includes both for the movement is distinctively American and every American movement which began in pioneer days and has lived through the cycles of American life until now has both followed the frontier and grown up with the country As to the future I am only a historian not a prophet But I shall be disappointed if this record of the past does not leave with the reader an acquaintance with the essential data upon which using his own judgment and imagination he will be disposed to project the curve of a future development far beyond any present attainments in promoting the ends for which the Disciples of Christ came into existence the unity and purity of the Church a reasonable and practical religion and the enrichment of life through fellowship in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ
