the award's recipients      **Eastern Air Lines** David Lee Russell, 2013-09-28 Eastern Air Lines began in 1926 when aviation pioneer Harold Gatty started the first carrier air mail route from New York to Atlanta under his company Pitcairn Aviation. Clement Keys of National Air Transport bought the company in 1929, changed the name to Eastern Air Transport, and began passenger service the next year on daily round trips between New York and Richmond. The growing airline was purchased by General Motors and became Eastern Air Lines in 1934. World War I flying ace Edward V. Rickenbacker purchased the airline four years later and led it to become by the 1950s the most profitable airline in the United States. Former astronaut Frank Borman became president of Eastern in 1975 and tried to manage the airline through deregulation, labor union conflict, and heavy debt, ending with the sale of Eastern to Frank Lorenzo and Texas Air in 1986. The airline entered bankruptcy in March 1989 and ended service in less than two years. This detailed history follows Eastern from start to finish, studying such corporate decision making as aircraft purchases and route expansions, as well as the personalities that shaped the airline throughout its history.

The advent of an American squadron or escadrille within the French air force, the Service Aeronautique, had been far from a simple process. French leaders initially held the belief common at the time that the war begun in 1914 would be a short one. The potential value of American volunteers fighting for France, both for propaganda purposes and for helping bring the power of the New World into the war on the side of the Allies, was thus irrelevant at first. By early 1915, however, the French began to accept American volunteers and assign them to escadrilles. In early 1916, the Service Aeronautique united several of these men in an elite chasse unit which quickly earned an enviable reputation for audacity, bravery, and success. This unit, the Lafayette Escadrille, had three consequences. First, its existence encouraged a large number of Americans far more than needed in one escadrille to volunteer for French aviation. These individuals, identified unofficially as members of a Lafayette Flying Corps, served in numerous French air units. Second, the publicity surrounding the Lafayette Escadrille contributed to favorable press for the Allied cause, strengthened ties between France and the U.S., and ultimately helped prepare the U.S. to participate on the Allied side of the conflict. Third, the existence of a large body of experienced American pilots provided combat veterans for

the Air Service of the American Expeditionary Forces AEF in France when the U S ultimately entered the war These veterans helped instill in the U S Air Service the attitudes and practices of the Service Aeronautique an infusion especially reflected in two U S pursuit squadrons the 103rd Aero Squadron made up of Lafayette Escadrille pilots and the 94th Aero Squadron the most famous American combat squadron of the war

1893 served in Britain's air forces for twenty eight years As a pilot in World War I he was credited with sixty one confirmed kills on the Western Front When World War II began in 1939 Air Commodore Collishaw commanded a Royal Air Force group in Egypt It was in Egypt and Libya in 1940-41 during the Britain's Western Desert campaign that he demonstrated the tenets of an effective air ground cooperation system Flying to Victory examines Raymond Collishaw's contribution to the British system of tactical air support a pattern of operations that eventually became standard in the Allied air forces and proved to be a key factor in the Allied victory The British Army and Royal Air Force entered the war with conflicting views on the issue of air support that hindered the success of early operations It was only after the chastening failure of Operation Battleaxe in June 1941 fought according to army doctrine that Winston Churchill shifted strategy on the direction of future air campaigns ultimately endorsing the RAF's view of mission and target selection This view adopted principles of air ground cooperation that Collishaw had demonstrated in combat Author Mike Bechthold traces the emergence of this strategy in the RAF air campaign in Operation Compass the first British offensive in the Western Desert in which Air Commodore Collishaw's small force overwhelmed its Italian counterpart and disrupted enemy logistics Flying to Victory details the experiences that prepared Collishaw so well for this campaign and that taught him much about the application of air power especially how to



work effectively with the army and Royal Navy As Bechthold shows these lessons learned altered the Allied approach to tactical air support and ultimately changed the course of the Second World War

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
