Ed Moses Ed Moses, John Yau, 1996 Ed Moses b 1928 is widely considered to be one of the central figures in the rich and complex history of postwar West Coast art Like Richard Diebenkorn and Sam Francis his work has been greatly influenced by the brilliant light of Southern California Modernism and European and American abstract art are also echoed in Moses s work and the vitality of his diverse oeuvre radiates throughout this first major retrospective of his paintings and drawings Although he attended art school Ed Moses is an autodidact who has labored to overcome his inability as he put it to draw three dimensionally And drawing has been central to his work the spine from which all of his art extends From his egg tempera paintings in the early 1950s to the ror shock paintings and drawings of the early 1990s he has found ways to investigate the relationship between spontaneity the legacy of abstract expressionism and control and balance inherited from Mondrian and the Russian constructivists Moving decisively from abstraction to figuration and from monochrome to tonality and color Moses like de Kooning and Pollock has consistently turned away from the predictable and has sought new ground In his bold exploration of forms and methods Ed Moses has avoided the label of a particular tradition and instead continues to reinvent himself With over seventy paintings and drawings that span his career this is the most comprehensive book on Ed Moses available today I felt as though these paintings were not something I created they were something I discovered Ed Creating the Future Michael Fallon, 2017-05-30 Conceived as a challenge to long Ed Moses Ed Moses,1988 Moses standing conventional wisdom Creating the Future is a work of social history cultural criticism that examines the premise that the progress of art in Los Angeles ceased during the 1970s after the decline of the Ferus Gallery the scattering of its stable of artists Robert Irwin Ed Kienholz Ed Moses Ed Rusha and others and the economic struggles throughout the decade and didn t resume until sometime around 1984 when Mark Tansey Alison Saar Judy Fiskin Carrie Mae Weems David Salle Manuel Ocampo among others became stars in an exploding art market However this is far from the reality of the L A art scene in the 1970s The passing of those fashionable 1960s era icons in fact allowed the development of a chaotic array of outlandish and independent voices marginalized communities and energetic sometimes bizarre visions that thrived during the stagnant 1970s Fallon's narrative describes and celebrates through twelve thematically arranged chapters the wide range of intriguing artists and the world not just the objects they created He reveals the deeper more culturally dynamic truth about a significant moment in American art history presenting an alternative story of stubborn creativity in the face of widespread ignorance and misapprehension among the art cognoscenti who dismissed the 1970s in Los Angeles as a time of dissipation and decline Coming into being right before their eyes was an ardent local feminist art movement which had lasting influence on the direction of art across the nation an emerging Chicano Art movement spreading Chicano murals across Los Angeles and to other major cities a new and more modern vision for the role and look of public art a slow consolidation of local street sensibilities car fetishism gang and punk aesthetics into the earliest version of what would later

The Ferus Gallery Kristine McKenna,2009 In 1950s California and especially in Los Angeles there existed few venues for contemporary art To a whole generation of California artists this presented a freedom since the absence of a context for their work meant that they could coin their own and in uncommonly interesting ways The careers of Ed Ruscha Wallace

Berman and Ed Kienholz all begin with this absence Ruscha turned to books as a means of dissemination Berman pioneered mail art through his magazine Semina and in March 1957 Ed Kienholz in collaboration with curator Walter Hopps co founded one of California's greatest historical galleries Ferus Within months of opening Ferus which is Latin for wild gained notoriety when the Hollywood vice squad raided Berman's first and in his lifetime last solo exhibition following a complaint about lewd material Shows by Kienholz and Jay DeFeo followed but 1962 was Ferus annus mirabilis with solo shows by Bruce Conner and Joseph Cornell and the first solo shows of Roy Lichtenstein and Andy Warhol on the west coast The following year Ferus also hosted Ed Ruscha's first solo exhibition After Kienholz and Hopps parted ways Hopps went on to mount the first American Duchamp retrospective at the Pasadena Art Musuem the reins were handed to Irving Blum who got Ferus out of the red and ran the gallery until its closure in 1966 A Place to Begin is an illustrated oral history of this heroic enterprise With 62 new interviews with Ferus artists and more than 300 photographs most previously unpublished it retrieves a lost chapter of twentieth century American art Edited by Kristine McKenna noted expert and co editor of the critically acclaimed Semina Culture Artbibliographies Modern ,1997 The California Handbook Ted Trzyna, Julie Didion,1998-10
