relevant to the study of a public art gallery owned and funded by the public and its elected representatives and controlled by these representatives and their appointed agents Furthermore the framework explores the concept of post colonial tensions between heritages specifically indigenous transplanted and autochthonous ones The significance of this becomes more apparent when the concepts used in relevant previous studies of specific public art galleries in New Zealand are reviewed There is also a strong emphasis on the development of a public Maori art collection It is a story too of vivid and influential personalities the directors and curators who fought for the gallery and the artists represented in it But the book is more than just the story of a single gallery s collection it shines a light on concerns and patterns that will be familiar to galleries everywhere and provides a unique perspective on New Zealand s cultural development over much of the twentieth century

Maori to Chinese to European scholars tackle numerous questions from many angles as well such as Do the Maori resent Chinese immigrants Do Chinese New Zealanders understand the role of the tangata whenua and Have Maori and Chinese formed alliances based on common values and history The result is an engaging portrait of the past and present relationships between two important peoples Since race relations in New Zealand have usually been examined in terms of Maori and Pakeha this unique exploration of Maori Chinese relations portrays a much richer and more complex social fabric

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
