Education, Social Background and Cognitive Ability Gary N. Marks, 2013-10-23 Are socioeconomic inequalities in education declining Is socioeconomic background becoming less important for people's occupational class or status How important is cognitive ability for education and later occupational outcomes How do countries differ in the importance of socioeconomic background for education and work Gary N Marks argues that in western industrialized countries pervasive views that socioeconomic background or class background has strong and unchanging relationships with education and later socioeconomic outcomes resistant to policy and social change are unfounded Marks provides a large amount of evidence from many countries showing that the influence of socioeconomic background for education is moderate and most often declining and socioeconomic background has only very weak impacts on adults occupation and earnings after taking into account education and cognitive ability Furthermore Marks shows that cognitive ability is a more powerful influence than socioeconomic background for educational outcomes and that in addition to its indirect effects through education has a direct effect on occupation and earnings Its effects cannot be dismissed as simply another aspect of socioeconomic background nor do the usual criticisms of cognitive ability apply The declining effects for socioeconomic background and the importance of cognitive ability support several of the contentions of modernization theory The book contributes to a variety of debates within sociology quantitative and qualitative approaches explanatory and non explanatory theory the relationship between theory and empirical research the role of political ideology in research sociology as a social science and sociology's contribution to knowledge about contemporary societies It will appeal to professionals in the fields of education and

Socially disadvantaged children around the world disproportionately suffer from lower levels of educational achievement which in turn leads to unfavourable long term outcomes in employment and health. *Education in the Best Interests of the Child* addresses this persistent problem which violates not only the principle of equal educational opportunity but also the broader principle of the best interests of the child as called for in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Building on the children's rights work accomplished in their previous book *Empowering Children*, Brian Howe and Katherine Covell identify three types of reform that can significantly close the educational achievement gap. Advances in the Conceptualization of the Stress Process William R. Avison, Carol S. Aneshensel, Scott Schieman, Blair Wheaton, 2009-10-21 In 1981 Leonard Pearlin and his colleagues published an article that would radically shift the sociological study of mental health from an emphasis on psychiatric disorder to a focus on social structure and its consequences for stress and psychological distress. Pearlin et al 1981 proposed a deceptively simple conceptual model that has now influenced sociological inquiry for almost three decades. With his characteristic penchant for reconsidering and elaborating his own ideas, Pearlin has revisited the stress process model periodically over the years (Pearlin 1989, 1999; Pearlin et al 2005; Pearlin and Skaff 1996). One of the consequences of this continued theoretical elaboration of the stress process has been the development of a sociological model of stress that embraces the complexity of social life. Another consequence is that the stress process has continued to stimulate a host of empirical investigations in the sociology of mental health. Indeed, it is no exaggeration to suggest that the stress process paradigm has been primarily responsible for the growth and sustenance of sociological research on stress and mental health. Pearlin et al 1981 described the core elements of the stress process in a brief paragraph. The process of social stress can be seen as combining three major conceptual domains: the sources of stress, the mediators of stress, and the manifestations of stress. Each of these extended domains subsumes a variety of subparts that have been intensively studied in recent years.

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classification of angiosperms based on the types of cotyledon present angiosperms are divided into two classes they are monocotyledons and dicotyledons the dicotyledonous angiosperms have two cotyledons in their seeds and the

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angiosperms are classified in a single phylum the anthophyta modern angiosperms appear to be a monophyletic group which means that they originated from a single ancestor flowering plants are divided into two major groups according to the structure of the cotyledons and pollen grains among others

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the angiosperms or in new terminology the magnoliophytes are the flowering plants which include perhaps as many as 400 000 species from the science of grapevines second edition 2015 related terms cladistics genus pollinator gymnosperm anthesis arabidopsis evolution tissues

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most modern angiosperms are classified as either monocots or eudicots based on the structure of their leaves and embryos basal angiosperms such as water lilies are considered more primitive because they share morphological traits with both monocots and eudicots

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presented several new orders are recognized boraginales dilleniales icacinales metteniusiales and vahliales this brings the total number of orders and families recognized in the apg system to 64 and 416 respectively

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in any event in this new classification the basal angiosperms contain three superorders or five if one includes magnolianaes and ceratophyllanaes that are coordinate with the monocots also placed in their own superorder and ten additional superorders eudicots for a

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abstract the synopsis of my classification of the angiospermae that was published in aliso thorne 1968 has been much modified in recent years increased knowledge about many of the families has resulted in a realignment of some of them and reorganization or deletion of some of the higher categories

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
