Junker, 2001 Amon G Carter 1879 1955 is one of the legendary men of Texas history Born in a log cabin he was self made becoming Fort Worth s leading citizen and champion He developed an interest in the art of Frederic Remington and Charles M Russell through his friendship with Will Rogers Carter s will provided for the establishment of a museum in Fort Worth devoted to the art of the American West While the museum holds the most significant collection anywhere of works by Remington and Russell and is a pioneer in the field of western studies it has evolved into one of the great museums of American art as a whole focusing on artists working on successive frontiers aesthetic as well as geographic Its photography collection alone has grown to nearly one quarter of a million objects The museum designed by noted architect Philip Johnson opened to the public in 1961 On the occasion of its fortieth anniversary a substantially expanded building also designed by Mr Johnson was inaugurated This volume relates the museum s history and presents color and duotone illustrations of 125 of its masterworks dating from 1822 to 1998 paintings sculpture prints watercolors pastels drawings and photographs with an essay about each and a biography of each artist It includes a number of landmark works recently added to the collection and unveiled here for the first time paintings by John Singer Sargent Stuart Davis and Marsden Hartley sculpture by Alexander Calder and Louise Nevelson a daguerreotype by Southworth and Hawes and photographs by Alfred Stieglitz David Smith Robert Adams and Linda Connor BOOK JACKET Title Summary field provided by Blackwell North America Inc All Rights Reserved Elie Nadelman , 1974 **Muralism Without Walls** Anna Indych-López, 2009 Examines the introduction of Mexican muralism to the United States in the 1930s and the challenges faced by the artists their medium and the political overtones of their work in a new society Enchantments Marci Kwon, 2021-04-06 The first major work to examine Joseph Cornell s relationship to American modernism Joseph Cornell 1903 1972 is best known for his exquisite and alluring box constructions in which he transformed found objects such as celestial charts glass ice cubes and feathers into enchanted worlds that blur the boundaries between fantasy and the commonplace Situating Cornell within the broader artistic cultural and political debates of midcentury America this innovative and

interdisciplinary account reveals enchantment's relevance to the history of American modernism. In this beautifully illustrated book Marci Kwon explores Cornell's attempts to convey enchantment, an ephemeral experience that exceeds rational explanation in material form. Examining his box constructions, graphic design projects and cinematic experiments, she shows how he turned to formal strategies drawn from movements like Transcendentalism and Romanticism to figure the immaterial. Kwon provides new perspectives on Cornell's artistic and graphic design career, bringing vividly to life a wide circle of acquaintances that included artists, poets, writers and filmmakers such as Mina Loy, Lincoln Kirstein, Frank O'Hara and Stan Brakhage. Cornell's participation in these varied milieus elucidates enchantment's centrality to midcentury conversations about art's potential for power and moral authority and reveals how enchantment and modernity came to be understood as opposing forces. Leading contemporary artists such as Betye Saar and Carolee Schneemann turned to Cornell's enchantment as a resource for their own anti-racist feminist projects. Spanning four decades of the artist's career, *Enchantment* sheds critical light on Cornell's engagement with many key episodes in American modernism, from Abstract Expressionism, 1930s folk art and the emergence of New York School poetry and experimental cinema to the transatlantic migration of Symbolism, Surrealism and ballet.

Encyclopedia of Jewish American Artists Samantha Baskind, 2007. *Encyclopedia of Jewish American Artists* presents over 80 19th and 20th century Jewish American artists ranging from the critically neglected Theresa Bernstein, Ruth Gikow and

Jennings Tofel to the well known Eva Hesse Roy Lichtenstein and Larry Rivers The subject matter of some of these artists may surprise readers Adolph Gottlieb designed and supervised the fabrication of a 35 foot wide four story high stained glass facade for a synagogue Louise Nevelson sculpted a Holocaust memorial and Philip Pearlstein painted a version of Moses with the Tablets of the Law early in his career Covering painters sculptors printmakers and photographers as well as artists who engage in newer forms of visual expression such as video conceptual and performance art the book is in part intended to stimulate further scholarship on these artists When appropriate entries reveal the influence of the Jewish American encounter on the artists work along with other factors such as gender and the immigrant experience In many cases the artists own words are employed to flesh out perspectives on their art as well as on their Jewish identity To that end the volume contains excerpts from recent interviews conducted by the author with some of the artists including Judy Chicago Audrey Flack Jack Levine and Sol LeWitt Illustrations accompanying each artist s entry some in color aid this invaluable look at Jewish American art

American Art at the Chrysler Museum Chrysler Museum, Martha N. Hagood, Jefferson C. Harrison, 2005 At the core of the Chrysler s holdings are works acquired by Walter P Chrysler Jr 1909 1988 whose collection came to what was then the Norfolk Museum of Arts and Sciences in 1971 While he was deeply interested in the art of the distant past Mr Chrysler also enthusiastically embraced the art of his contemporaries He paid homage to the richness and diversity of twentieth century American art with the acquisition of works by realist painters such as Robert Henri and George Bellows Abstract Expressionists including Jackson Pollock Franz Kline and Hans Hofmann and Pop artists Andy Warhol and Roy Lichtenstein American Art at the Chrysler Museum also includes noteworthy art of the 1980s 1990s and beyond gifts from local Hampton Roads citizens who have maintained this commitment to the art of the present

Objects and Meaning M. Anna Fariello, Paula Owen, 2004 *Objects and Meaning* expands upon a national conversation questioning how various academic disciplines and cultural institutions approach and assign meaning to artist made objects in postmodern North America Although most of the discourse since the mid 20th century revolved around the split between art and craft the contributors to this collection of essays take a broader view examining the historical cultural and theoretical perspectives that defined the parameters of that conversation Their focus is on issues concerning works that appeared to cross over from mainstream art to an amorphous and pluralistic aesthetic milieu that has yet to be defined
