Franco, 2023-09-26 From 2001 to 2007 the world renowned Prado

Museum in Madrid Spain underwent an ambitious expansion project that reorganized the spatial design of the museum and allowed for additional exhibition space Coinciding with the completion of this large construction project were a series of celebrations surrounding the 2010 bicentenary of South American independence movements a clear reminder of the complicated relationship between Spain and its former colonies in Latin America Inspired by this significant historical moment and with an eye to diversifying its predominantly Spanish centered permanent collection the Prado Museum decides to host a competition for a new gallery of Latin American art The game begins in 2010 as students assuming the roles of curators art patrons living artists and art dealers set into motion a series of negotiation sessions that will help the museum decide which artworks to choose for the new gallery Students will analyze a broad range of artistic movements and styles related to Latin American art from the twentieth to the twenty first centuries in an effort to support the acquisition of paintings that best represent the diverse artistic legacies and historical heritage of the region Artists from Latin American Cultures Kristin G. Congdon, Kara Kelley Hallmark, 2002-10-30 Latin Americans have long been relegated to the cultural background obscured by the dominant European culture This biographical dictionary profiles 75 artists from the United States and 13 nations of Central and South America and the Caribbean including painters sculptors photographers muralists printmakers installation artists and performance artists Some of their works recall pre Columbian times others confront the cultural imperialism of the U S over Latin America and many explore how the dominant elements of culture can affect identities of class gender and sexuality Profiled artists range from the renowned to the little known Frida Kahlo Tina Modotti Diego Rivera Myrna Baez Raquel Forner Patrocino Barela and many more Color photographs are provided for many of the works Each entry includes information about the artist s childhood schooling creative growth and artistic styles and themes Exemplary artworks and influences are described along with a look at popular and critical responses Supplemental features include artist cross references a glossary of essential terms from the art world and a number of vivid photos portraying the artists in their creative environments *Diego Rivera's America* James Oles, 2022-07-19 Diego Rivera s America revisits a historical moment when the famed muralist and painter more than any other artist of his time helped forge Mexican national identity in visual terms and imagined a shared American future in which unity rather than division was paramount This volume accompanies a major exhibition highlighting Diego Rivera s work in Mexico and the United States from the early 1920s through the mid 1940s During this time in his prolific career Rivera created a new vision for the Americas on both national and continental levels informed by his time in both countries Rivera s murals in Mexico and the U S serve as points of departure for a critical and contemporary understanding of one of the most aesthetically socially and politically ambitious artists of the twentieth century Works featured include the greatest number of paintings and drawings from this period reunited since the artist s lifetime presented alongside fresco panels and mural sketches This catalogue serves as a guide to two crucial decades in Rivera s career illuminating his most important themes from traditional markets

New York in the 1920s and 1930s was a modernist mecca that drew artists writers and other creators of culture from around the globe Two such expatriates were Mexican artist and Renaissance man Miguel Covarrubias and Hungarian photographer Nickolas Muray Their lifelong friendship gave Muray an entrance into Covarrubias's circle of fellow Mexican artists Frida Kahlo Rufino Tamayo Juan Soriano Fernando Castillo Guillermo Meza Roberto Montenegro and Rafael Navarro whose works Muray collected This outstanding body of Mexican modernist art now owned by the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center HRC at the University of Texas at Austin forms the subject of this beautifully illustrated volume Produced in conjunction with the Ransom Center's exhibition Miguel Covarrubias A Certain Clairvoyance this volume contains color plates of virtually all the items in Nickolas Muray's collection of twentieth century Mexican art The majority of the works are by Covarrubias while the excellent works by the other artists reflect the range of aesthetic shifts and modernist influences of the period in Mexico Accompanying the plates are five original essays that establish Covarrubias's importance as a modernist impresario as influential in his sphere as Ezra Pound T S Eliot and Jean Cocteau were in theirs Likewise the essays reestablish the significance of Nickolas Muray whose success as a master of color photography portraiture advertising imagery and commercial illustration has made him difficult to place within the history of photography as a fine art As a whole this publication of the Nickolas Muray Collection vividly illustrates the transgression of generic boundaries and the cross fertilization among artists working in different media from painting and photography to dance and ethnography that gave modernism its freshness and energy It also demonstrates that American modernism was thoroughly infused with a fervor for all things Mexican of which Covarrubias was a principal proponent and that Mexican modernists no less than their American
