French Gay Modernism Lawrence R. Schehr, 2004 The first four decades of the twentieth century saw male homosexuality appear in French literature with increasing frequency and boldness Departing from earlier more muted presentations Andr Gide Marcel Proust Jean Cocteau Ren Crevel Francis Carco and a host of less famous writers all created overtly gay characters and gave them increasingly numerous and significant roles Far from being simply shunned or marginalized a number of these works were instead accepted as canonical Lawrence Schehr's *French Gay Modernism* is the only study devoted to the analyzing these representations of male homosexuality in early twentieth century French literature Schehr explains how earlier representations of homosexuality encoded rather than conspicuous served as a basis for later writers to treat homosexual behavior as sets of relationships rather than as secrets or scandals The prominence of authors such as Proust and Gide also helped other writers take up homosexual relationships in their work often by adopting the same representational strategies Schehr doesn't limit his study to high literary culture however He devotes considerable attention to popular writers whose homosexual characters encounter contempt scorn and worse and whose portrayals of homosexual couples and society were at once more open and more at risk

legal divorce represents the central socio legal event of the turn of the century in matters of legitimacy whereas the Franco Prussian War of 1870 and the First World War furnish chronological bookends for this book Besides through history law and sociology this book treats illegitimacy through the lens of various branches of gender and sexual theory particularly the study of masculinities and a handful of other important critical theories most importantly those of Michel Foucault Eve Sedgwick Todd Reeser Charles Stivale and Gilles Deleuze and F lix Guattari Bachelors and bastards are two principal players in the representation of illegitimacy in Maupassant and Gide but this study considers the theme of illegitimacy as extended beyond simple questions of legitimate versus illegitimate children The male bastard is only one of the Counterfeit characters examined in these authors fictional texts This book is divided into three parts which consider specific thematic elements of their bastard narratives Part One frames the representation in fiction of bachelor figures and how they contribute to or the roles they play in instances of illegitimacy Part Two springs from and develops the metaphor of the counterfeit coin whether represented by a bastard son an affected schoolboy a false priest or a pretentious litt rateur Part Three explains the concept of nomadic masculine practices such practices include nomadic styles of masculinity development as well as the bastard s nomadism

The Sculpted Ear Ryan McCormack,2020-04-17 Sound and statuary have had a complicated relationship in Western aesthetic thought since antiquity Taking as its focus the sounding statue a type of anthropocentric statue that invites the viewer to imagine sounds the statue might make The Sculpted Ear rethinks this relationship in light of discourses on aurality emerging within the field of sound studies Ryan McCormack argues that the sounding statue is best thought of not as an aesthetic object but as an event heard by people and subsequently conceptualized into being through acts of writing and performance Constructing a history in which hearing plays an integral role in ideas about anthropocentric statuary McCormack begins with the ancient sculpture of Laoco n before moving to a discussion of the early modern automaton known as Tipu s Tiger and the statue of the Commendatore in Mozart s Don Giovanni Finally he examines statues of people from the present and the past including the singer Josephine Baker the violinist Aleksandar Nikolov and the actor Bob Newhart with each case touching on some of the issues that have historically plagued the aesthetic viability of the sounding statue McCormack convincingly demonstrates how sounding statues have served as important precursors and continuing contributors to modern ideas about the ontology of sound technologies of sound reproduction and performance practices blurring traditional divides between music sculpture and the other arts A compelling narrative that illuminates the stories of individual sculptural objects and the audiences that hear them this book will appeal to anyone interested in the connections between aurality and statues in the Western world in particular scholars and students of sound studies and sensory history
