EZRA POUND'S INFLUENCE ON LITERARY CRITICISM

Although invariably mentioned in accounts of twentieth-century literary criticism, Ezra Pound is not generally regarded as a major formative influence on it. He founded no school of criticism comparable to that of F. R. Leavis or the Chicago Aristotelians; he enunciated no coherent body of doctrine; he edited no periodical as influential or as long-lived as the Criterion, Scrutiny, or Modern Philology. He did not succeed in engaging any great interest for his major enthusiasms, such as the poetry of the troubadours, the verse form of Gautier, or the critical ideas of Remy de Gourmont.

In his contempt for the insularity of the British critical tradition. he never bothered to write essays that might have given him a secure place in that tradition; he never, for instance, wrote an essay on Shakespeare, Milton, Dryden, Wordsworth, or Tennyson. He concentrated, instead, on the poets of Provence and Italy and on the state of contemporary literature. Had he written extensively on Dante, he might have secured some attention for his ideas, but he chose to devote most of his time to Arnaut Daniel and Guido Cavalcanti. Had he written essays on the major figures of modern literature, he would have secured attention, but he chose to devote most of his promotional campaigns to gaining recognition for writers rather than to offering his own considered critical opinions about them; once a writer was established, Pound turned his attention elsewhere. His major critical essays are, then, on literatures other than English. His essays on British and American literature are either on secondary figures, such as Crabbe, or, if they are on important modern figures, such as Yeats, Frost, Joyce, Eliot, or William Carlos Williams, they are occasional
