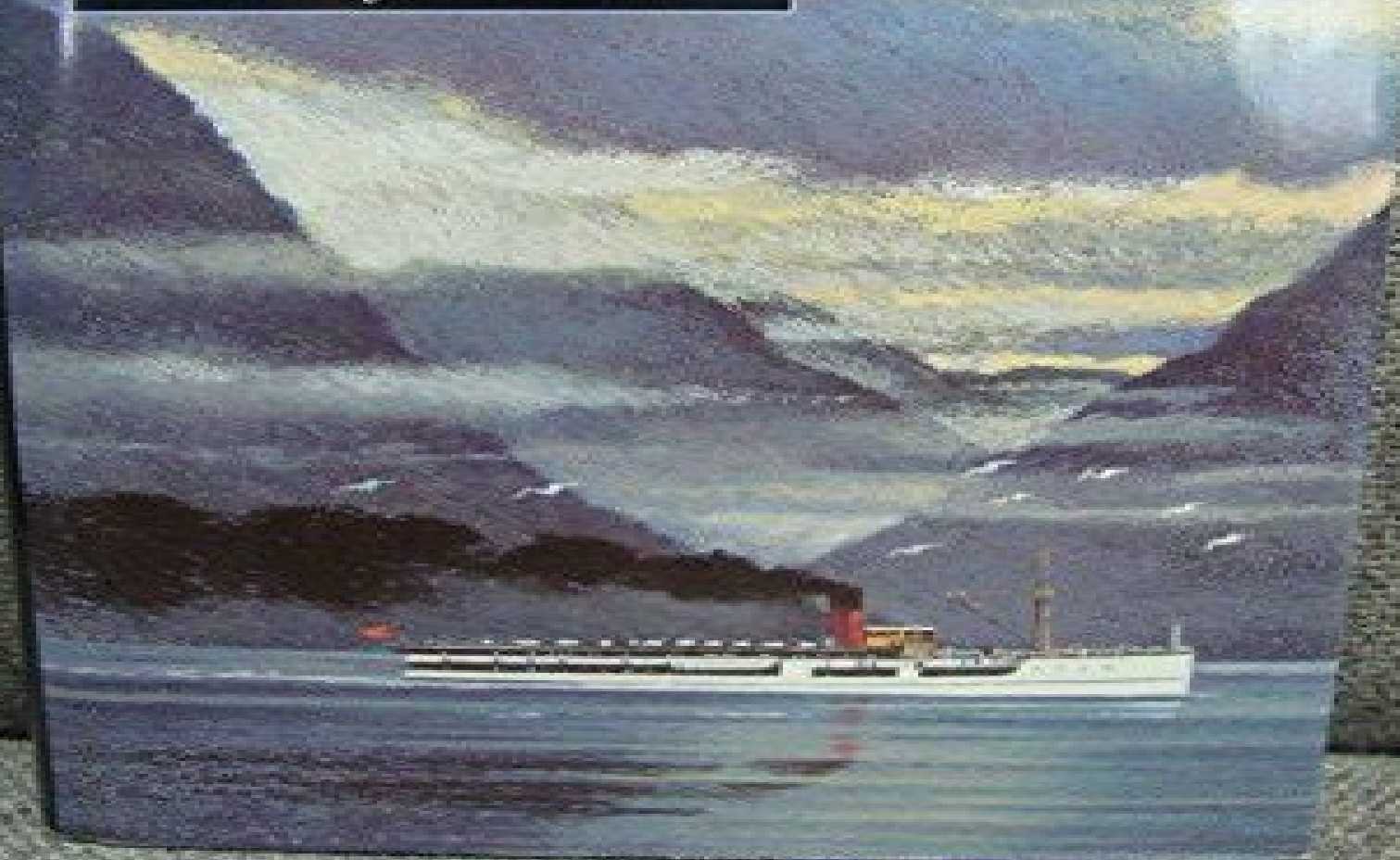

Goetzfridt, 1995-02-28 Oceania has a rich and growing literary tradition The imaginative literature that emerged in the 1960s often reflected the forms and structures of European literature though the ideas expressed were typically anticolonial After three decades the literature of Oceania has become much more complex in terms of style as well as content and authors write in a multiplicity of styles and voices While the written literature of Oceania is continuously gaining more critical attention questions about the imposition of European literary standards and values as a further extension of colonialism in the Pacific have become a central issue This book is a detailed survey of the expanding amount of critical and interpretive material written about the imaginative literature of authors from Oceania It focuses on commentary and scholarship concerned with the poetry fiction and drama written in English by indigenous peoples of the Pacific Islands New Zealand and Australia The criticisms have appeared in academic books and journals since the mid 1960s They have developed to the point at which critical issues related to decolonization and the expression of ideas without having to first satisfy foreign expectations often determine the direction of such discussions Entries are grouped in topical chapters and each entry includes an extensive annotation An introductory essay summarizes the evolution of Pacific literature **Albert Wendt and Pacific Literature** Paul Sharrad, 2003-11-08 Albert Wendt is the leading writer and exponent of Pacific literature His work is consistently different in style politically challenging and ranges across essays plays poems stories and novels two of which have been filmed This book is the first full length study of his work There is an introduction to Pacific literature as a whole and Wendt s Samoan background Chapters offer readings of all Wendt s major texts in chronological sequence relating them to his essays to literary movements of the time and to key motifs from Polynesian culture There is an extensive bibliography of works by and about Wendt **Once Were Pacific** Alice Te Punga Somerville, 2012 Explores the relationship between indigeneity and migration among Maori and Pacific peoples Encyclopedia of Post-Colonial Literatures in English Eugene Benson, 2004-11-30 Documents the history and development of Post colonial literatures in English together with English and American literature and includes original research relating to the literatures of some 50 countries and territories In more than 1 600 entries written by more than 600 internationally

recognized scholars it explores the effect of the colonial and post colonial experience on literatures in English worldwide

Telling Stories, 2021-11-15 The present volume is a highly comprehensive assessment of the postcolonial short story since the thirty six contributions cover most geographical areas concerned Another important feature is that it deals not only with exclusive practitioners of the genre Mansfield Munro but also with well known novelists Achebe Armah Atwood Carey Rushdie so that stimulating comparisons are suggested between shorter and longer works by the same authors In addition the volume is of interest for the study of aspects of orality dialect dance rhythms circularity and trickster figure for instance and of the more or less conflictual relationships between the individual character or implied author and the community Furthermore the marginalized status of women emerges as another major theme both as regards the past for white women settlers or the present for urbanized characters primarily in Africa and India The reader will also have the rare pleasure of discovering Janice Kulik Keefer's Fox her version of what she calls in her commentary displaced autobiography or creative non fiction Lastly an extensive bibliography on the postcolonial short story opens up further possibilities for research

### **Ancestry of Experience**

Leilani Holmes, 2016-08-31 As Hawaiians continue to recover their language and culture the voices of kupuna elders are heard once again in urban and rural settings both in Hawai'i and elsewhere How do kupuna create knowledge and tell history What do they tell us about being Hawaiian Adopted by a Midwestern couple in the 1950s as an infant Leilani Holmes spent much of her early life in settings that offered no clues about her Hawaiian past images of which continued to haunt her even as she completed a master's thesis on Hawaiian music and identity in southern California Ancestry of Experience documents Holmes' quest to reclaim and understand her own origin story Holmes writes in two different and at times incongruent voices one describing the search for her genealogy the other critiquing Western epistemologies she encounters along the way In the course of her journey she finds that Hawaiian oral tradition links identity to the land *aina* through ancestry while traditional scholarly theories of knowing particularly political economy and the discourse of the invention of tradition textually obliterate land and ancestry In interviews with kupuna Holmes learns of the connectedness of spirituality and *aina* through her study and practice of hula *kahiko* comes an understanding of ancient hula as a conversation between *aina* and the dancer's body that has the power to activate historical memory Holmes' experience has special relevance for indigenous adoptees and indigenous scholars Both are distanced from the knowledge agendas and strategies of their communities and are tasked to speak in languages ill suited to the telling of their own stories and those of their ancestors In addition to those with an interest in Hawaiian knowledge and culture Ancestry of Experience will appeal to readers of memoirs of identity academic and personal accounts of racial identity formation and works of indigenous epistemologies A website [www.ancestryofexperience.com](http://www.ancestryofexperience.com) will include supplementary material
