## Faber murder aide faces life in prison

The last of two companion first degree murder cases ended Friday with the conviction of Ricardo Hart for assisting his girl friend in the robbery and fatal shooting of 39-year-old Nancy Faber last Nov. 22.

"It was a verdict and we have to live with that verdict," said Hart's attorney, Thomas E. Quarterman. "Naturally I was surprised and shocked," he said, adding that his 21-year-old client will appeal the verdict.

Friday's jury decision brought to a close two back-to-back trials that spanned six weeks in the courtroom of Washtenaw Circuit Judge Ross W. Campbell.

Hart's girl friend, Macheile Pearson, 17, was found guilty June 1 of the same charges of first degree murder, armed robbery and possession of a firearm.

Hart, who showed no visible emotion when the verdict was announced, will be sentenced to mandatory life imprisonment on July 13.

The jury of six women and six men deliberated about seven hours before reaching a verdict late Friday afternoon.

"Good police work and a good

jury," were in favor of the prosecution, commented Brian Mackie, assistant county prosecutor at the trial's end. "If you look at the makeup of the jury, it's clear that they were not tainted by the public-

ity in the case," he said.

Mackie also credited the testimony of the prosecution's two key witnesses — Cornelius Antonio Frazier and his girlfriend, Mary Gordon — as the most persuasive element for jurors. "They were believable," said Mackie.

Frazier and Gordon testified that Hart told them of the role he played in the armed robbery and shooting.

Defense attorney Quarterman, on the other hand, had attempted to reinforce his client's defense by shaking the credibility of the two witnesses and bringing to light inconsistencies in their stories.

Frazier, the half brother of Hart, was first implicated in the shooting Dec. 18 when Pearson called the Michigan State Police Ypsilanti Post to report an assault. She eventually began telling Trooper Henry Tyler about her knowledge of the Faber shooting.

In several interviews with Tyler and Ann Arbor Police Detective Richard Anderson, Pearson gave at least three different versions of what happened until she herself admitted to the shooting on the morning of her Dec. 21 arrest.

Pearson, in her own trial, accused her boyfriend of four years

young girls working in factories manufacturing wallpaper in the 19th century were poisoned by the arsenic based green pigments used for the leaves of the popular floral designs Even in the middle of the 20th century accidental mercury poisoning caused many deaths in Minamata Bay while leaded petrol poisoned the whole planet and arsenic still continues to poison millions in Asia Through vividly told stories of innocent blunders industrial accidents poisoners of various hues cold cunning desperate and deaths that remain a mystery Emsley here uncovers the dark side of the Periodic Table

era Gura also gives us the key to understanding what sets the early novel apart arguing that it is distinguished by its roots in the fundamental religiosity of American life Our nation s pioneering novelists it turns out wrote less in the service of art than of morality This history begins with a series of firsts the very first American novel William Hill Brown s *The Power of Sympathy* published in 1789 the first bestsellers Susanna Rowson s *Charlotte Temple* and Hannah Webster Foster s *The Coquette* novels that were like Brown s cautionary tales of seduction and betrayal and the first native genre religious tracts which were parables intended to instruct the Christian reader Gura shows that the novel did not leave behind its proselytizing purpose even as it evolved We see Catharine Maria Sedgwick in the 1820s conceiving of *A New England Tale* as a critique of Puritanism s harsh strictures as well as novelists pushing secular causes George Lippard s *The Quaker City* from 1844 was a dark warning about growing social inequality In the next decade certain writers Hawthorne and Melville most famously began to depict interiority and doubt and in doing so nurtured a broader cultural shift from social concern to individualism from faith in a distant god to faith in the self Rich in subplots and detail Gura s narrative includes enlightening discussions of the technologies that modernized publishing and allowed for the printing of novels on a mass scale and of the lively cultural journals and literary salons of early nineteenth century New York and Boston A book for the reader of history no less than the reader of fiction *Truth s Ragged Edge* the title drawn from a phrase in Melville about the ambiguity of truth is an indispensable guide to the fascinating unexpected origins of the American novel
